"AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED: An Ordinance providing for the improvement of Washington street, in the city of Henderson, Ky., from the east side of Green street to the west line of the right of way of the Illinois Central Railroad Company; and providing for the payment of such improvement, was read the second time and on motion of Haag, seconded by Mayor Hall said ordinance was approved and adopted on its second and final reading.

Aye: Hall, Haag, Cunningham, three ayes.

The Mayor declared the said ordinance approved and adopted on its second and final reading.

Said Ordinance is here copied as follows to wit.

An Ordinance providing for the improvement of Washington street, in the city of Henderson, Ky., from the east side of Green street to the west line of the right of way of the Illinois Central Railroad Company; and providing for the payment of such improvement.

WHEREAS the Board of commissioners of the city of Henderson, Ky., has heretofore, to wit, on May 17, 1923, adopted a resolution designating Washington street from the east side of Green street to the west line of the right of way of the Illinois Central Railroad Company, as a portion of said street to be improved, which resolution set out in general terms the character and extent of the proposed improvement and declared such improvement to be a necessity, and was published in the Henderson Daily Gleaner, a newspaper of general circulation published in said city, on the 18th day of May, 1923, Now, Therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of commissioners of the city of Henderson, Kentucky:

SECTION 1. That the following portions of Washington street, in the city of Henderson, Ky., from the east side of Green street to the west line of the right of way of the Illinois Central Railroad Company and between the curb and gutter lines on the east and west sides thereof, be improved by excavating, grading and draining the same, and by paving the same with asphalt pavement, as hereinafter provided, and by the construction of catch basins, inlets and necessary drains, and draining said street, as hereinafter provided.

SECTION 2. The surface of the paving provided for in Section 1 hereof shall be flush with the gutters at the gutter lines on the east and west sides of said street, where such gutters now exist, and shall be flush with the grades for said gutters at the gutter lines on the east and west sides of said street

An Ordinance providing for the improvement of Washington street from the east side of Green to the I.C.R.R.C. 2nd reading.

Beginning in the east line of Graan street and center line of Washington street at an elevation of 86.25 above city datum; thence eastwardly along the center line of Washington street; a distance of 250 feet to an elevation of 72.42 feet; thence 142 feet to an elevation of 71.15; thence 208 feet to an elevation of 74.90; thence 250 feet to an elevation of 84.45; thence 280 feet to an elevation of 86.40; thence 150 feet to an elevation of 86.20; thence 80 feet to an elevation of 85.80; thence 398 feet to an elevation of 88.10; thence 72 feet to an elevation of 86.40; thence 100 feet to an elevation of 80.50; thence 50 feet to an elevation of 78.45; thence 50 feet to an elevation of 74.00; thence 300 feet to an elevation of 64.40 feet; thence 200 feet to an elevation of 61.60; thence 250 feet to an elevation of 62.50; thence 250 feet to an elevation of 68.05; thence 150 feet to an elevation of 76.30; thence 100 feet to an elevation of 79.70; thence 150 feet to an elevation of 82.30; thence 350 feet to an elevation of 83.90; thence 167 feet to an elevation of 82.90; thence 33 feet to an elevation of 82.90; thence 200 feet to an elevation of 81.90; thence 100 feet to an elevation of 79.20; thence 200 feet to an elevation of 64.90; thence 103 feet to an elevation of 63.50; thence 66 feet to an elevation of 63.30.

SECTION 3. Said pavement shall be constructed of one of the following types (a) sheet asphalt, (b) asphaltic concrete, or (c) "Warrenite-Bitulithic" on a portland cement concrete foundation, or on an asphaltic concrete foundation. Said sheet asphalt (a) shall be made in two layers, consisting of a lower or binder course $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches thick, and an upper or wearing course $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches thick. Said asphaltic concrete (b) and "Warrenite-Bitulithic" (c) shall be made in one layer 2 inches thick. The materials, methods and workmanship employed in the construction of all the above shall conform to the plans and specifications for said work on file with the commissioner of public works and property of the city of Henderson, which are made a part hereof, and are hereby approved and adopted.

SECTION 4. Catch basins, inlets and necessary drains for draining said Washington street shall be constructed on said street as shown on the said plans for said work, and shall be in the manner and of the materials specified and shown by the aforesaid plans and specifications.

SECTION 5. All of said Washington street between the east side of Green street and the west line of the right of way of the Illinois Central R.R. Co., a width of 50 feet, having been heretofore laid off as a public street and having been open to the unrestricted use of the general public for more than 5 consecutive years last past, the same is hereby declared to have been dedicated to the city as a public street, and to have been accepted by the city as such; and the city does hereby accept such dedication of such street and the said portion thereof as one of the public streets of the city of Henderson, and hereby declares the improvement of said street, as herein provided, to be a necessity.

SECTION 6. That the Board of commissioners of said city shall let, by contract, the furnishing of all labor and materials and the construction of the aforesaid improvements, and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of said improvement, upon competitive bidding, to the lowest and best bidder, after the advertising of the letting of said contract for two consecutive weeks in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city. The Mayor is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for proposals for furnishing all labor and materials and the construction of said improvement and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of such work.

The right to reject any and all proposals is hereby reserved to the said board of commissioners.

Proposals shall be received on any or all of the said types of pavement named in section 3 hereof.

Each bidder shall accompany his proposal by a certified check, payable to the city of Henderson, Ky., for a sum equal to five per cent. (5%) of the total amount of his bid, as a guaranty to insure compliance with his bid, and the same shall be forfeited to the city in the event the accepted bidder fails to comply with his bid and enter into the contract and bond herein required, within ten (10) days after said contract shall have been awarded to him and he shall have received notice thereof.

When any proposal has been rejected the check deposited therewith shall be returned to the bidder depositing the same.

All proposals shall state prices bid, both in words and figures, and shall be based upon the items and quantities furnished by the city engineer and must be submitted on blank forms furnished by the city, and must be sealed when submitted.

Proposals will be received and publicly opened by the Mayor and commissioners at the time and place designated in the advertisement for proposals, and all proposals received shall be tabulated and compared and laid before the board of commissioners at some regular or special meeting thereof, for the acceptance or rejection of such bids.

SECTION 7. When any proposal shall have been accepted the bidder making the same shall, not later than ten days after notice from the city so to do enter into a written contract with the city by which the said bidder shall contract, covenant and agree, among other things, as follows, to wit:

To furnish all labor and materials, and construct said improvements and guarantee the same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of same;

To finish and complete the said improvements within the time specified in said plans, specifications and proposals;

To execute and deliver to the city a bond in a sum equal to sixty-six and two-thirds per cent. (66-2/3%) of the total amount of such bid, as

which said bond shall be approved by the Board of commissioners of the city, conditioned that the contractor shall promptly begin, faithfully perform and fully complete all of said improvements and pay for all materials mentioned in said proposal and contract, and well and truly, and in a workmanlike and substantial manner, and in accordance with the terms of said proposal, contract, plans, detailed drawings and specifications provided therefor; complete the said improvements; and faithfully and fully, and in each and every respect comply with the conditions contained in said proposal and contract; and pay all sums of money agreed to be paid for work and labor done in and about the performance of said contract, and save the city of Henderson harmless from all loss and damage on account thereof.

To guarantee the said improvements against defects in workmanship and materials for the full period of five years from the date of acceptance of such work;

To indemnify the city of Henderson against loss or damage on account of any claim or award arising under the Workmen's Compensation Law of the Commonwealth of Kentucky in the execution of such work;

To assume at his own expense the defense of any suit or claim against the city of Henderson growing out of or arising in connection with all or any part of said work, immediately upon receipt of notice from the city of the filing of any suit or claim against it on such account; to bear all the expenses of such defense; and to satisfy any judgement or award that may be obtained thereon against the city.

SECTION 8. The contract for said improvements shall be ratified by the board of commissioners of the city before the same shall be binding upon the city; and the city shall reserve the right to furnish other or additional surety on the bond provided for in the foregoing section at any time, at the cost and expense of the contractor.

The contractor to whom said work shall be awarded shall designate an agent who shall be a resident of the city of Henderson, upon whom process against any such contractor may be served, and upon or to whom any notice herein required may be served or given. The contractor shall state in his said contract the name and address of such agent, and shall at all times during the life of such contract and bond maintain in the city such an agent, and shall give the city written notice of any change in the address of such agent, if such agent be not found in the city at any time any notice otherwise would be served upon or given to him may be given by registered mail, addressed to the last designated address of such agent, or to the contractor at the address stated in his proposal, and such notice shall constitute a notice to the contractor.

SECTION 9. That the improvement of said portion of Washington street shall, except as herein otherwise provided, be made at the exclusive cost of the owners of real estate abutting on such improvements, respectively, and shall be apportioned among and assessed upon the lots or parcels of real estate abutting on such improvement, according to the number of front or abutting feet of each property owner; and tax shall be levied upon such lots or parcels of real estate for the payment of the costs assessed thereon, which tax shall be due and payable at the office of the treasurer of the city of Henderson upon the completion and acceptance thereof by the board of commissioners, as is provided by law, and no such property shall be exempt from such improvement tax.

That the cost of the improvement of the intersections of said street and portions thereof with other public ways, from property line to property line, shall be assessed against and paid for by the city of Henderson.

That any assessment for any street improvement as provided in this ordinance which exceed one-half of the value of the lots or parcels of real estate upon which the assessment is made shall, to the extent of such excess, be assessed against and paid by the city of Henderson, but the improvement shall be taken into consideration in fixing the value of such real estate.

SECTION 10. That the said improvements shall be made on the ten year payment plan, and when same shall have been completed and the cost thereof ascertained and reported to the board of commissioners, and the work shall have been accepted and the engineer's estimate of the cost shall have been confirmed by the board of commissioners, it shall, by ordinance, apportion the cost of said work, less such part as shall be assessed against and paid by the city, equally among the owners of abutting property on both sides of the street improved, according to the number of abutting feet owned by them respectively; and shall assess and levy a local tax on the several lots or parcels of abutting property at a rate abutting foot sufficient to produce the part of the cost of the improvement apportioned to such lots or parcels of property, and shall apportion and assess to the city such part of the cost for which it is liable.

The Mayor of the city shall cause the said assessment ordinance to be published one time in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city.

Such local taxes shall, at the option of the said property owners, be payable in cash or in ten (10) annual instalments, as provided by law.

The tax bills for such assessments may, in addition to the other remedies provided by law, be sold and the collection thereof enforced in the manner provided by law for the collection of municipal taxes.

SECTION 11. That the liens provided by law to secure the payment of the cost of such part of said improvements as the owners of real estate abutting upon such improvements may be respectively bound for as hereinafter provided, shall be enforced as in the manner provided by law for the enforcement of such liens, and in the name of the contractor or other persons entitled thereto; but said city shall in no event be liable for any such costs, and

SECTION 12. That the payment for such work the city shall pay to the contractor or other person entitled thereto, within thirty (30) days from the date of the publication of the assessing ordinance, such part of said improvements as is herein provided shall be paid by the city; and will, also, at the same time, pay over all assessments which may have been paid in cash.

In order to provide a fund for the immediate payment of such part of the cost of said improvements as shall not be paid in cash, the board of commissioners shall issue and sell improvements bonds in anticipation of the collection of such part of the local taxes assessed and levied therefor as may not be paid within thirty days from the date of the publication of the assessing ordinance, in the manner and form provided by law, said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of six per centum, payable semi-annually.

The Mayor shall advertise for bids for said bonds by notice, published in some newspaper of general circulation, published in said city, one time, at least 10 days before the receipt of bids, and at the time and place designated in said notice the Mayor and commissioners shall receive sealed bids for said bonds, each bidder shall accompany his bid by a certified check payable to the city of Henderson, or by a bond with good surety, for the sum of One Thousand Dollars, to secure compliance with his bid; and the Mayor and commissioners shall publicly open and compare all bids received at some regular or special meeting of the board of commissioners; and the board of commissioners reserves the right to reject any and all bids. Said bonds shall not be sold for less than par and any interest that may have accrued thereon.

Said bonds when executed shall be delivered to the treasurer for safe keeping, and he shall be responsible therefor. In case the said bonds be sold, the proceeds thereof shall be placed to the credit of the city, in a separate fund, and the contractor or other person entitled thereto shall be paid for such work out of the said fund, should the bonds be not sold, the same shall be delivered to the contractor or other person entitled thereto. The delivery of said bonds, either to the purchaser or to the contractor or to other persons entitled thereto, shall be made by the city treasurer at his office in the city of Henderson, and such treasurer shall take receipts for same.

SECTION 13. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its second and final passage.

Read first time and approved June 20th 1923.
Read second time and approved July 2nd. 1923.

An Ordinance providing for the improvement of Main street from the north side of Second street to the south side of Fourth street 2nd reading

"AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED" An Ordinance providing for the improvement of Main street, in the city of Henderson, Ky., from the north side of Second street to the south side of Fourth street, and between the curb and gutter lines on the east and west sides thereof; and providing for the payment of such improvement, was read the second time and on motion of Cunningham, seconded by Haag, said ordinance was approved and adopted on its second and final reading.

Aye: Hall, Haag, Cunningham. three ayes:

The Mayor declared the said ordinance approved and adopted on its second and final reading.

Said Ordinance is here copied as follows to wit:

"AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED" An Ordinance providing for the improvement of Main street, in the city of Henderson, Ky., from the north side of Second street to the south side of Fourth street, and between the curb and gutter lines on the east and west sides thereof; and providing for the payment of such improvement.

WHEREAS the Board of commissioners of the city of Henderson, Ky., has heretofore, to wit, on May 17, 1923, adopted a resolution designating Main street from the north side of Second street to the south side of Fourth street, as a portion of said street to be improved, which resolution set out in general terms the character and extent of the proposed improvement and declared such improvement to be a necessity, and was published in the Henderson Daily Gleaner, a newspaper of general circulation published in said city, on the 18th day of May, 1923, Now, Therefore,

Be it ordained by the Board of commissioners of the city of Henderson, Kentucky:

SECTION 1. That the following portions of Main street, in the city of Henderson, Ky., from the north side of Second street to the south side of Fourth street, and between the curb and gutter lines on the east and west sides thereof, be improved, by excavating, grading and draining the same, and by paving the same with asphalt pavement, as hereinafter provided, and by the construction of catch basins, inlets and necessary drains, and draining said street, as hereinafter provided,

SECTION 2. The surface of the paving provided for in section 1 hereof shall be flush with the gutters at the gutter lines on the east and west sides of said street, and its center line shall conform to the following grade, to wit:

Beginning at the intersection of said center line of Main street and the extension of the south property line of Fourth street to an elevation of 77.1 above city datum line, and running thence in a southerly direction along said center line of Main street a distance of 140 feet to an elevation of 78.7; thence along said center line a distance of 50 feet to an elevation of 79.0 feet; thence along said center line a distance of 100 feet to an elevation of 78.95 feet; thence along said center line 100 feet to an elevation of 78.30 feet; thence along said center line 50 feet to an elevation of 77.70 feet; thence along said center line 61 feet to an elevation of 77.20 feet; thence along said center line 139 feet to an elevation of 77.50 feet; thence along said center line 50 feet to an elevation of 77.30 feet; thence along said center line 100 feet to an elevation of 75.80 feet; thence along said center line 100 feet to an elevation of 73.90 feet; thence along said center line 60 feet to an elevation of 73.00 feet; at the intersection of said center line of Main street with the north property line of Second street.

SECTION 3. Said pavement shall be constructed of one of the following types (a) sheet asphalt, (b) asphaltic concrete, or (c) "Warrenite-Bitulithic", on a portland cement concrete foundation, or on an asphaltic concrete foundation.

Said sheet asphalt (a) shall be made in two layers, consisting of a lower or binder course 1-1/2 inches thick, and an upper or wearing course 1-1/2 inches thick. Said asphaltic concrete (b) and "Warrenite-Bitulithic" (c) shall be made in one layer 2 inches thick.

The materials, methods and workmanship employed in the construction of all the above shall conform to the plans and specifications for said work on file with the commissioner of Public Works and property of the city of Henderson, which are made a part hereof, and are hereby approved and adopted.

Proposals shall be received on any or all of the aforesaid types of pavement.

SECTION 4. Catch basins, inlets and necessary drains for draining said Main street shall be constructed on said street as shown on the said plans for said work, and shall be in the manner and of the materials specified and shown by the aforesaid plans and specifications.

SECTION 5. All of said Main street between the south margin of Fourth street and the north margin of Second street, a width of 100 feet, having been heretofore laid off as a public street and having been open to the unrestricted use of the general public for more than five consecutive years last past, the same is hereby declared to have been dedicated to the city as a public street, and to have been accepted by the city as such; and the city does hereby accept such dedication of such street and the said portion thereof as one of the public streets of the city of Henderson, and hereby declares the improvement of said street, as herein provided, to be a necessity.

SECTION 6. That the board of commissioners of said city shall let, by contract, the furnishing of all labor and materials and the construction of the aforesaid improvements, and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of said improvement, upon competitive bidding, to the lowest and best bidder, after the advertising of the letting of said contract for two consecutive weeks in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city. The Mayor is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for proposals for furnishing all labor and materials and the construction of said improvements and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of such work.

The right to reject any and all proposals is hereby reserved to the said Board of commissioners.

Proposals shall be received on any or all of the said types of pavement named in section 3 hereof.

Each bidder shall accompany his proposal by a certified check, payable to the city of Henderson, Kentucky, for a sum equal to five per cent. (5%) of the total amount of his bid, as a guaranty to insure compliance with his bid, and the same shall be forfeited to the city in the event the accepted bidder fails to comply with his bid and enter into the contract and the bond herein required, within ten (10) days after said contract shall have been awarded to him and he shall have received notice thereof.

When any proposal has been rejected the check deposited therewith shall be returned to the bidder depositing the same.

All proposals shall state prices bid, both in words and figures, and shall be based upon the items and quantities furnished by the city engineer, and must be submitted on blank forms furnished by the city, and must be sealed when submitted.

Proposals will be received and publicly opened by the Mayor and commissioners at the time and place designated in the advertisement for proposals, and all proposals received shall be tabulated and compared and laid before the board of commissioners at some regular or special meeting thereof, for the acceptance or rejection of such bids.

SECTION 7. When any proposal shall have been accepted the bidder making the same shall, not later than ten (10) days after notice from the city so to do, enter into a written contract with the city by which the said bidder shall contract, covenant and agree among other things, as follows, to wit:

To furnish all labor and materials, and construct said improvements and guarantee the same for a period of five (5) years from the date of acceptance of same;

To finish and complete the said improvements within the time specified in said plans, specifications and proposals;

as surety thereon, which said bond shall be approved by the board of commissioners of the city, conditioned that the contractor shall promptly begin, faithfully perform and fully complete all of said improvements and pay for all materials mentioned in said proposal and contract, and well and truly, and in a workmanlike and substantial manner, and in accordance with the terms of said proposal, contract, plans, detailed drawings and specifications provided therefor, complete the said improvements, and faithfully and fully and in each and every respect comply with the conditions contained in said proposal and contract, and pay all sums of money agreed to be paid for work and labor done in and about the performance of said contract, and save the city of Henderson harmless from all loss and damage on account thereof.

To guarantee the said improvements against defect in workmanship and materials for the full period of five (5) years from the acceptance of such work;

To indemnify the city of Henderson against loss or damage on account of any claim or award arising under the workmen's Compensation Law of the Commonwealth of Kentucky in the execution of such work;

To assume at his own expense the defense of any suit or claim against the city of Henderson growing out of or arising in connection with all or any part of said work, immediately upon receipt of notice from the city of the filing of any suit or claim against it on such account; to bear all the expenses of such defense; and to satisfy any judgment or award that may be obtained thereon against the city.

SECTION 8. The contract for said improvements shall be ratified by the board of commissioners of this city before the same shall be binding upon the city; and the city shall reserve the right to furnish other or additional surety on the bond provided for in the foregoing section at any time, at the cost and expense of the contractor.

The contractor to whom said work shall be awarded shall designate an agent who shall be a resident of the city of Henderson, upon whom process against any such contractor may be served, and upon or to whom any notice herein required may be served or given. The contractor shall state in his said contract the name and address of such agent, and shall at all times during the life of such contract and bond maintain in the city such an agent and shall give the city written notice of any change in the address of such agent. If such agent be not found in the city at any time any notice which otherwise would be served upon or given to him may be given by registered mail, addressed to the last designated address of such agent, or to the contractor at the address stated in his proposal, and such notice shall constitute a notice to the contractor.

SECTION 9. That the improvement of said portion of Main street shall, except as herein otherwise provided, be made at the exclusive cost of the owners of real estate abutting on such improvements, respectively, and shall be apportioned among and assessed upon the lots or parcels of real estate abutting on such improvement, according to the number of front or abutting feet of each property owner; and tax shall be levied upon such lots or parcels of real estate for the payment of the costs assessed thereon, which tax shall be due and payable at the office of the treasurer of the city of Henderson upon the completion and acceptance thereof by the board of commissioners, as is provided by law, and no such property shall be exempt from such improvement tax.

That the cost of the improvement of the intersections of said street and portions thereof with other public ways, from property line to property line, shall be assessed against and paid for by the city of Henderson.

"AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED" An Ordinance providing for the improvement of Green street, in the city of Henderson, Ky., from the south side of Third street to the south side of Twelfth street; and providing for the payment of such improvement, was read the second time and on motion of Cunningham, seconded by Haag, said ordinance was approved and adopted on its second and final passage.

Aye: Hall, Haag, Cunningham. three ayes:

The Mayor declared the said ordinance approved and adopted on its second and final passage.

"AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED" An ordinance providing for the improvement of Green street, in the city of Henderson, Ky., from the south side of Third street to the south side of Twelfth street; and providing for the payment of such improvement.

WHEREAS the board of commissioners of the city of Henderson, Ky., has heretofore, to wit, on May 17, 1923, adopted a resolution designating Green street, from the south side of Third street to the south side of Twelfth street, as a portion of said street to be improved, which said resolution set out in general terms the character and extent of the proposed improvement and declared such improvement to be a necessity, and was published in the Henderson Daily Gleaner, a newspaper of general circulation published in said city, on the 18th, day of May, 1923; Now, Therefore,

Be it Ordained by the board of commissioners of the city of Henderson, Kentucky:

SECTION 1. That the following portions of Green street, in the city of Henderson, Ky., from the south side of Third street to the south side of Twelfth street, and between the curb and gutter lines on the east and west sides thereof and between the east and west lines of said street where no curb and gutter lines have been established, be improved, by excavating, grading and draining the same as herein provided, and by paving the same with asphalt pavement as hereinafter provided, and by the construction of catch basins, inlets and necessary drains, and draining said street as hereinafter provided.

SECTION 2. The surface of the paving provided for in section 1 hereof shall have a modified parabolic curve from the center line to its outside edges the total crown for the pavement shall be 1/6th of an inch for each foot of width and the grade at any point shall be proportional to the square of its distance from the center, and its center line shall conform to the following grade, which is hereby fixed and established as follows, to wit:

Beginning at the south line of Third street at an elevation of 72.50 above city datum, along the center line of Green street in a northerly direction 290 feet to an elevation of 72.2 feet; thence 150 feet to an elevation of 72.3 feet; thence 200 feet to an elevation of 71.65 feet; thence 50 feet to an elevation of 71.4 feet; thence 381 feet to an elevation of 72.5 feet; thence 90 feet to an elevation of 72.7 feet; thence 453 feet to an elevation of 74.8 feet; thence 40 feet to an elevation of 74.9 feet; thence 450 feet to an elevation of 77.2 feet; thence 73 feet to an elevation of 77.5 feet; thence 138 feet to an elevation of 75.05 feet; thence 50 feet to an elevation of 74.62 feet; thence 125 feet to an elevation of 74.8 feet; thence 200 feet to an elevation of 75.8 feet; thence 150 feet to an elevation of 76.4 feet; thence 300 feet to an elevation of 79.7 feet; thence 50 feet to an elevation of 80.0 feet; thence 50 feet to an elevation of 79.9 feet; thence 150 feet to an elevation of 79.4 feet; thence 25 feet to an elevation of 79.35 feet; thence 140 feet to an elevation of 80.75 feet; thence 50 feet to an elevation of 82.7 feet; thence 660 feet to an elevation of 102.5 feet; thence 50 feet to an elevation of 103.3 feet; thence 150 feet to an elevation of 100.1 feet; thence 50 feet to an elevation of 99.4 feet; thence 153 feet to an elevation of 98.2 feet, the south line of Twelfth street.

SECTION 3. That portion of the improvement of said Green street from the south side of Third street to the south side of Fourth street shall be improved by the construction therein of a carriage-way the full width of said street and between the curb and gutter lines on the east and west sides thereof; that portion of said Green street from the south side of Fourth street to the south side of Tenth street, shall be improved by the construction therein of a carriage-way thirty feet in width; and that portion of said street from the south side of Tenth street to south side of Twelfth street

The carriage-ways herein provided to be constructed shall be of one of the following types: (a) sheet asphalt, (b) asphaltic concrete, or (c) "Warrenite-Bitulithic, on a portland cement concrete foundation or on an asphaltic concrete foundation. Said sheet asphalt (a) shall be made in two layers, consisting of a lower, or binder course 1-1/2 inches thick, and an upper or wearing course 1-1/2 inches thick. Said asphaltic concrete (b) and "Warrenite-bitulithic" (c) shall be made in one layer two inches thick.

Proposals shall be received on any or all of the aforesaid types of pavement.

The materials, methods and workmanship employed in the construction of all of the above mentioned improvements shall conform to the plans and specifications for said work, on file with the commissioner of Public Works and property of the city of Henderson, which are made a part hereof and are hereby approved and adopted.

SECTION 4. Catch basins, inlets and necessary drains for draining said Green street shall be constructed on said street as shown on the said plans for said work, and shall be in the manner and of the materials specified and shown by the aforesaid plans and specifications.

SECTION 5. All of said Green street, between the south side of Third street and the south side of Twelfth street, having been heretofore laid off as a public street 100 feet in width and having been opened to the unrestricted use of the general public for more than five consecutive years last past, the same is hereby declared to have been dedicated to the city as a public street and to have been accepted by the city as such; and the city does hereby accept such dedication of the said street and said portion thereof as one of the public streets of the city of Henderson; and hereby declares the improvement of said street as herein provided to be a necessity.

SECTION 6. That the board of commissioners of said city shall let, by contract, the furnishing of all labor and materials and the construction of the aforesaid improvements, and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of said improvement, upon competitive bidding, to the lowest and best bidder, after the advertising of the letting of said contract for two consecutive weeks in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city. The Mayor is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for proposals for furnishing all labor and materials and the construction of said improvement and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of such work.

The right to reject any and all proposals is hereby reserved to the said board of commissioners.

Proposals shall be received on any or all of the said types of pavement named in section 3 hereof.

Each bidder shall accompany his proposal by a certified check, payable to the city of Henderson, Ky., for a sum equal to five per cent. (5%) of the total amount of his bid, as a guaranty to insure compliance with his bid, and the same shall be forfeited to the city in the event the accepted bidder fails to comply with his bid and enter into the contract and bond herein required, within ten (10) days after said contract shall have been awarded to him and he shall have received notice thereof.

When any proposal has been rejected the check deposited therewith shall be returned to the bidder depositing the same.

All proposals shall state prices bid, both in words and figures, and shall be based upon the items and quantities furnished by the city engineer, and must be submitted on blank forms furnished by the city, and must be sealed when submitted.

Proposals will be received and publicly opened by the Mayor and commissioners at the time and place designated in the advertisement for proposals, and all proposals received shall be tabulated and compared and laid before the board of commissioners at some regular or special meeting thereof, for the acceptance or rejection of such bids.

SECTION 7. When any proposal shall have been accepted the bidder making the same shall, not later than ten days after notice from the city so to do, enter into a written contract with the city by which the said bidder shall contract, covenant and agree among other things, as follows, to wit:

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SECTION 8. The contract for said improvements shall be ratified by the board of commissioners of this city before the same shall be binding upon the city; and the city shall reserve the right to furnish other or additional surety on the bond provided for in the foregoing section at any time, at the cost and expense of the contractor.

The contractor to whom said work shall be awarded shall designate an agent who shall be a resident of the city of Henderson, upon whom process against any such contractor may be served, and upon or to whom any notice herein required may be served or given. The contractor shall state in his said contract the name and address of such agent, and shall at all times during the life of such contract and bond maintain in the city such an agent, and shall give the city written notice of any change in the address of such agent, if such agent be not found in the city at any time any notice which otherwise would be served upon or given to him may be given by registered mail, addressed to the last designated address of such agent, or to the contractor at the address stated in his proposal, and such notice shall constitute a notice to the contractor.

SECTION 9. That the improvement of said portion of Green street shall, except as herein otherwise provided, be made at the exclusive cost of the owners of real estate abutting on such improvements, respectively, and shall be apportioned among and assessed upon the lots or parcels of real estate abutting on such improvement, according to the number of front or abutting feet of each property owner; and tax shall be levied upon such lots or parcels of real estate for the payment of the costs assessed thereon, which tax shall be due and payable at the office of the treasurer of the city of Henderson upon the completion and acceptance thereof by the board of commissioners, as is provided by law, and no such property shall be exempt from such improvement tax.

That the cost of the improvement of the intersections of said street and portions thereof with other public ways, from property line to property line, shall be assessed against and paid for by the city of Henderson.

That any assessment for any street improvement as provided in this ordinance which exceeds one-half of the value of the lots or parcels of real estate upon which the assessment is made shall, to the extent of such excess, be assessed against and paid by the city of Henderson, but the improvement shall be taken into consideration in fixing the value of such real estate.

SECTION 10. That the said improvements shall be made on the ten year payment plan, and when same shall have been completed and the cost thereof ascertained and reported to the board of commissioners, and the work shall have been accepted and the engineer's estimate of the cost shall have been confirmed by the board of commissioners, it shall, by ordinance, apportion the cost of said work, less such part as shall be assessed against and paid by the city, equally among the owners of abutting property on both sides of the street improved, according to the number of abutting feet owned by them, respectively; and shall assess and levy a local tax on the several lots or parcels of abutting property at a rate per abutting foot sufficient to produce the part of the cost of the improvement apportioned to such lots or parcels of property, and shall apportion and assess to the city such part of the cost for which it is liable.

The Mayor of the city shall cause the said assessment ordinance to be published one time in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city.

Such local taxes shall, at the option of the said property owners, be payable in cash or in ten annual instalments, as provided by law.

The tax bills for such assessments may, in addition to the other remedies provided by law, be sold and the collection thereof enforced in the manner provided by law for the collection of municipal taxes.

SECTION 11. That the liens provided by law to secure the payment of the cost of such part of said improvements as the owners of real estate abutting upon such improvements may be respectively bound for as herein-after provided, shall be enforced as in the manner provided by law for the enforcement of such liens, and in the name of the contractor or other person entitled thereto; but said city shall in no event be liable for any such costs nor for the costs of any such improvements except as herein stated, and except to the extent of the funds actually paid to it as herein provided; and a failure to collect any such local assessment or taxes or instalment thereof when due shall create no liability against the city.

SECTION 12. That in payment for such work the city shall pay to the contractor or other person entitled thereto, within thirty (30) days from the date of the publication of the assessing ordinance, such part of said improvements as is herein provided shall be paid by the city; and will, also, at the same time, pay over all assessments which may have been paid in cash.

In order to provide a fund for the immediate payment of such part of the cost of said improvements as shall not be paid in cash, the board of commissioners shall issue and sell improvement bonds in anticipation of the collection of such part of the local taxes assessed and levied therefor as may not be paid within thirty days from the date of the publication of the assessing ordinance, in the manner and form provided by law. Said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of six per centum, payable semi-annually.

The Mayor shall advertise for bids for said bonds by notice, published in some newspaper of general circulation, published in said city, one time, at least ten (10) days before the receipt of bids, and at the time and place designated in said notice the Mayor and commissioners shall receive sealed bids for said bonds. Each bidder shall accompany his bid by a certified check, payable to the city of Henderson, or by a bond with good surety, for the sum of One Thousand Dollars, to secure compliance with his bid; and the Mayor and commissioners shall publicly open and compare all bids received at some regular or special meeting of the board of commissioners; and the board of commissioners reserves the right to reject any and all bids. Said bonds shall not be sold for less than par and any interest that may have accrued thereon.

To indemnify the city of Henderson against loss or damage on account of any claim or award arising under the Workmen's Compensation Law of the Commonwealth of Kentucky in the execution of such work;

To assume at his own expense the defense of any suit or claim against the city of Henderson growing out of or arising in connection with all or any part of said work, immediately upon receipt of notice from the city of the filing of any suit or claim against it on such account; to bear all the expenses of such defense; and to satisfy any judgment or award that may be obtained thereon against the city.

SECTION 8. The contract for said improvements shall be ratified by the board of commissioners of this city before the same shall be binding upon the city; and the city shall reserve the right to furnish other or additional surety on the bond provided for in the foregoing section at any time, at the cost and expense of the contractor.

and upon or to whom any notice herein required may be served or given. The contractor shall state in his said contract the name and address of such agent, and shall at all times during the life of such contract and bond maintain in the city such an agent, and shall give the city written notice of any change in the address of such agent. If such agent be not found in the city at any time any notice which otherwise would be served upon or given to him may be given by registered mail, addressed to the last designated address of such agent, or to the contractor at the address stated in his proposal, and such notice shall constitute a notice to the contractor.

SECTION 9. That the improvement of said portion of Green street shall, except as herein otherwise provided, be made at the exclusive cost of the owners of real estate abutting on such improvements, respectively, and shall be apportioned among and assessed upon the lots or parcels of real estate abutting on such improvement, according to the number of front or abutting feet of each property owner; and tax shall be levied upon such lots or parcels of real estate for the payment of the costs assessed thereon, which tax shall be due and payable at the office of the treasurer of the city of Henderson upon the completion and acceptance thereof by the board of commissioners, as is provided by law, and no such property shall be exempt from such improvement tax.

That the cost of the improvement of the intersections of said street and portions thereof with other public ways, from property line to property line, shall be assessed against and paid for by the city of Henderson.

That any assessment for any street improvement as provided in this ordinance which exceeds one-half of the value of the lots or parcels of real estate upon which the assessment is made shall, to the extent of such excess, be assessed against and paid by the city of Henderson, but the improvement shall be taken into consideration in fixing the value of such real estate.

SECTION 10. That the said improvements shall be made on the ten year payment plan, and when same shall have been completed and the cost thereof ascertained and reported to the board of commissioners, and the work shall have been accepted and the engineer's estimate of the cost shall have been confirmed by the board of commissioners, it shall, by ordinance, apportion the cost of said work, less such part as shall be assessed against and paid by the city, equally among the owners of abutting property on both sides of the street improved, according to the number of abutting feet owned by them respectively; and shall assess and levy a local tax on the several lots or parcels of abutting property at a rate per abutting foot sufficient to produce the part of the cost of the improvement apportioned to such lots or parcels of property, and shall apportion and assess to the city such part of the cost for which it is liable.

The Mayor of the city shall cause the said assessment ordinance to be published one time in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city.

Such local taxes shall, at the option of the said property owners, be payable in cash or in ten (10) annual instalments, as provided by law.

The tax bills for such special assessments may, in addition to the other remedies provided by law, be sold and the collection thereof enforced in the manner provided by law for the collection of municipal taxes.

SECTION 11. That the liens provided by law to secure the payment of the cost of such part of said improvements as the owners of real estate abutting upon such improvements may be respectively bound for as hereinafter provided, shall be enforced as in the manner provided by law for the enforcement of such liens, and in the name of the contractor or other persons entitled thereto; but said city shall in no event be liable for any such costs, nor for the costs of any such improvements except as herein stated, and except to the extent of the funds actually paid to it as herein provided; and a failure to collect any such local assessment or taxes or instalment thereof when due shall create no liability against the city.

SECTION 12. That in payment for such work the city shall pay to the contractor or other person entitled thereto, within thirty (30) days from the date of the publication of the assessing ordinance, such part of said improvements as is herein provided shall be paid by the city; and will, also, at the same time, pay over all assessments which may have been paid in cash.

In order to provide a fund for the immediate payment of such part of the cost of said improvements as shall not be paid in cash, the board of commissioners shall issue and sell improvement bonds in anticipation of the collection of such part of the local taxes assessed and levied therefor as may not be paid within thirty days from the date of the publication of the assessing ordinance, in the manner and form provided by law. Said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of six per centum, payable semi-annually.

The Mayor shall advertise for bids for said bonds by notice, published in some newspaper of general circulation, published in said city, one time, at least ten (10) days before the receipt of bids, and at the time and place designated in said notice the Mayor and commissioners shall receive sealed bids for said bonds. Each bidder shall accompany his bid by a certified check, payable to the city of Henderson, or by a bond with good surety, for the sum of One Thousand Dollars, to secure compliance with his bid; and the Mayor and commissioners shall publicly open and compare all bids received at some regular or special meeting of the board of commissioners; and the board of commissioners reserves the right to reject any and all bids. Said bonds shall not be sold for less than par and any interest that may have accrued thereon.

Said bonds when executed shall be delivered to the city treasurer for safe keeping, and he shall be responsible therefor.

In case the said bonds be sold, the proceeds thereof shall be placed to the credit of the city, in a separate fund, and the contractor or other person entitled thereto shall be paid for such work out of the said fund. Should the bonds be not sold, the same shall be delivered to the contractor or other person entitled thereto. The delivery of said bonds, either to the purchaser or to the contractor or to other persons entitled thereto, shall be made by the city treasurer at his office in the city of Henderson, and such treasurer shall take receipts for same.

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SECTION 13. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its second and final passage.

"AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED", An Ordinance providing for the improvement of a portion of the north and south sides of Washington street from the east line of Green street to the west line of Holloway street in the city of Henderson, Kentucky, and providing for the payment thereof, was read the second time and on motion of Cunningham, seconded by Haag, said ordinance was approved and adopted on its second and final reading.

Aye: Hall, Haag, Cunningham, three ayes:

The Mayor declared the said ordinance approved and adopted on its second and final reading.

Said Ordinance is here copied as follows to wit:

An Ordinance providing for the improvement of a portion of the north and south sides of Washington street from the east line of Green street to the west line of Holloway street in the city of Henderson, Kentucky, and providing for the payment thereof.

Be it ordained by the board of commissioners of the city of Henderson, Kentucky:-

SECTION 1. That the north and south side of Washington street from the east line of Green street to the west line of Holloway street and extending along said property lines between the above named streets out to a point eleven (11) feet from the property lines on the north and south sides are hereby established as sidewalks, curbs and gutters. The grades for the property lines of said sidewalks, curbs and gutters are hereby fixed and established as follows, to wit:

Grades for the north side: Beginning at the intersection of the east line of Green street with the north line of Washington street at an elevation of 84.8 feet above city datum line and running thence in a easterly direction with the north line of Washington street 250 feet to an elevation of 72.4 feet; thence 140 feet to an elevation of 71.3 feet; thence 210 feet to an elevation of 75.00 feet; thence 200 feet to an elevation of 82.7 feet; thence 100 feet to an elevation of 85.00 feet; thence 150 feet to an elevation of 86.1 feet; thence 75 feet to an elevation of 85.8 feet; thence 50 feet to an elevation of 86.00 feet; thence 350 feet to an elevation of 88.2 feet; thence 75 feet to an elevation of 86.4 feet; thence 100 feet to an elevation of 80.7 feet; thence 100 feet to an elevation of 77.0 feet; thence 225 feet to an elevation of 74.7 feet; to the west line of Holloway street.

Grades for the south side: Beginning at the intersection of the east line of Green street with the south line of Washington street at an elevation of 86.5 feet above city datum line and running thence in a easterly direction with the south line of Washington street 250 feet to an elevation of 72.5 feet; thence 150 feet to an elevation of 71.3 feet; thence 200 feet to an elevation 75.00 feet; thence 250 feet to an elevation of 84.2 feet; thence 200 feet to an elevation of 86.5 feet; thence 150 feet to an elevation of 86.1 feet; thence 75 feet to an elevation of 85.8 feet; thence 400 feet to an elevation of 88.1 feet; thence 75 feet to an elevation of 86.5 feet; thence 100 feet to an elevation of 80.7 feet; thence 100 feet to an elevation of 77.0 feet; thence 225 feet to an elevation of 74.7 feet, to the west line of Holloway street.

The said improvement shall be laid and constructed so as to conform as nearly as practicable to the above grades.

SECTION 11. Said sidewalks shall be laid and constructed of concrete five (5) feet in width in all respects of the kind quality and

An Ordinance providing for the improvement of a portion of the north and south sides of Washington from Green to Holloway street 2nd reading.

"An Ordinance providing the kind and character of sidewalks, Curbing and guttering to be hereafter used in the city of Henderson, Kentucky, and prescribing specifications for same", Passed on its second reading by the Board of commissioners of the city of Henderson, Ky., on 30th day of September, 1922, and recorded in the office of city clerk of said city, in Ordinance Book No. 5, at page 168. There shall be left for grass plot or grass plots, all the space between the property line and outer edge of side walks, curb and gutter not occupied by the sidewalk, curb and gutter.

The sidewalk on the north side of Washington street between Alves and Alvasia abutting the property of the Central Presbyterian church is, hereby excepted from the provisions of section 11, the same having been already constructed.

SECTION 11l. There shall be laid and constructed within the space above mentioned, at the discretion of the city engineer, either a combined concrete curb and gutter 36" in width, or a concrete gutter adjoining the present limestone curb after same has been rebuilt. The combined curb and gutter shall be constructed of the materials and dimensions and in all respects as provided in section 4, specifications No. 3 of the aforesaid ordinance providing for the kind and character of sidewalks, curbing and guttering. The rebuilt curb and gutter shall be constructed as follows: Wherever designated by the engineer, the limestone curb and brick gutter shall be reconstructed in accordance with the following specifications:

The brick gutter shall be removed and the limestone curb shall be adjusted to meet lines and grades to be furnished by the engineer.

The subgrade beneath such adjusted curbs shall be of thoroughly compacted material, gravel or broken stone being used where deemed necessary by the engineer. The contractor shall exercise all reasonable precaution to prevent injury to existing sidewalks, and may be required to replace sections which he has damaged. The finished curb shall present a neat and workman-like appearance. All joints of same shall be well made, and shall not show a aperture: at the top of, over 1/8 of an inch. Such joints shall be filled with portland cement mortar.

After the adjustment of the limestone curb there shall be attached thereto a concrete gutter thirty (30) inches in width, constructed in accordance with the plan for the same on file in the office of the city engineer, which is hereby adopted and in accordance with section 4, specifications No. 3 of the above said ordinance providing for kind, and character of sidewalks, curbing and guttering, except that the provisions of the above section shall apply to gutter only and sub-section 6 of the same shall be omitted.

SECTION 1V. Sections Nos. 1, 7, 8, and 9 of the aforesaid ordinance are also herein referred to and made parts of this ordinance.

SECTION V. That the entire cost and expense of the aforesaid sidewalks curbing and guttering, including the work and the furnishing of the materials as provided for in this ordinance, shall be paid by the owners of the property abutting on the side of the street on which the improvement is made, each corner lot having its sidewalk intersection included in its frontage, and the said costs apportioned among said owners according to the number of abutting feet owned, by them respectively. Provided that when the cost of said improvement assessed against any lot or parcel of real estate or owner thereof exceeds one-half of the value of such lot or parcel of real estate, such excess shall be paid out of the general fund of the city of Henderson, but the improvement shall be taken into consideration in fixing the value of such real estate.

SECTION VI. That the improvement provided for in this ordinance shall be made on the ten year plan and paid for in ten annual installments as provided for by section 3458 of the act of the general Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, entitled,

"An act to amend and re-enact sections Three thousand four hundred and forty nine, three thousand four hundred and fifty, three thousand four hundred and fifty one, three thousand four hundred and fifty two, three thousand four hundred and fifty three, three thousand four hundred and fifty four, three thousand four hundred and fifty five, three thousand four hundred and fifty six, three thousand four hundred and fifty seven, three thousand four hundred and fifty eight, three thousand four hundred and fifty nine of the Kentucky Statutes relating to the control and improvement of public street, alleys, sidewalks, roads, lanes, avenues, highways, and thoroughfares in cities of the third class," which was approved by the Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky on March 7, 1916, and which is chapter 10 of the acts of the general Assembly of Kentucky of 1916.

The work provided for herein shall be done by contract, let by said city upon competitive bidding to the lowest and best bidder after advertisement for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published in the city of Henderson, Kentucky, the said city reserving the right to reject any and all bids, and each bidder shall be required to accompany his bid with a cash deposit of \$100.00 with the city clerk of said city or by a certified check for that amount payable to the said city as guaranty of his good faith to insure compliance with his bid, and which amount shall be forfeited to said city in the event his bid is accepted and he shall fail to comply with his bid and enter into a satisfactory contract and bond for the construction of said work and the furnishing of said material. The bond for said work is hereby fixed at a sum equal to one-half the estimated contract price, and the contract made hereunder shall stipulate a guarantee by the contractor of said work for five years from its acceptance by the board of commissioners.

SECTION VII. All ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting here with are hereby repealed.

SECTION VIII. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its second and final passage.

AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED, An Ordinance providing for the improvement of Green street, in the city of Henderson, Kentucky, from the south side of First street to the south side of Clay street, and between the curb and gutter lines on the east and west sides thereof; and providing for the payment of such improvement, was read the second time and on motion of com'r Cunningham, seconded by commissioner Haag same was approved and adopted on its second and final reading.

Aye: Hall, Haag, Cunningham. three ayes:
 The Mayor declared the said ordinance approved and adopted on its second and final reading.

Said Ordinance is here copied as follows:

AN ORDINANCE providing for the improvement of Green street, in the city of Henderson, Kentucky, from the south side of First street to the south side of Clay street, and between the curb and gutter lines on the east and west sides thereof; and providing for the payment of such improvement.

WHEREAS the Board of commissioners of the city of Henderson, Ky., has heretofore, twit on May 18, 1923, adopted a resolution designating Green street from the south side of First street to the south side of Clay street, as a portion of said street to be improved, which resolution set out in general terms the character and extent of the proposed improvement and declared such improvement to be a necessity, and was published in the Henderson Daily Gleaner, a newspaper of general circulation published in said city on the 19th day of May, 1923; Now Therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the board of commissioners of the city of Henderson, Kentucky:

SECTION 1. That the following portions of Green street, in the city of Henderson, Kentucky, from the south side of First street to the south side of Clay street, and between the curb and gutter lines on the east and west sides thereof, be improved by excavating, grading and draining the same, and by paving the same with asphalt pavement, as hereinafter provided, and by the construction of catch basins, inlets and necessary drains and draining said street as hereinafter provided.

SECTION 2. The surface and paving provided for in section 1 hereof shall be flush with the gutter at the gutter lines on the east and west sides thereof, and its center line shall conform to the following grade, twit:

Beginning at a point in the south line of First street at an elevation of 68.90 feet above city datum and running along the center line of said street in a southerly direction 185 feet to an elevation of 71.00 feet; thence 300 feet to an elevation of 73.30 feet; thence 100 feet to an elevation of 75.30 feet; thence 100 feet to an elevation of 78.80 feet; thence 100 feet to an elevation of 83.95 feet; thence 100 feet to an elevation of 88.40 feet; thence 100 feet to an elevation of 90.50 feet; thence 100 feet to an elevation of 92.30 feet; thence 200 feet to an elevation of 93.03 feet; thence 400 feet to an elevation of 95.90 feet; thence 200 feet to an elevation of 96.80 feet; thence 105 feet to an elevation of 98.10 feet to a point in the south line of Clay street,

SECTION 3. Said pavement shall be constructed of one of the following types (a) sheet asphalt, (b) asphaltic concrete, or (c) "Warrenite-biulithic", on a portland cement foundation, or on an asphaltic concrete foundation.

Said sheet asphalt (a) shall be made in two layers, consisting of a lower or binder course 1 1/2 inches thick, and an upper or wearing course 1 1/2 inches thick. Said asphaltic concrete (b) and "Warrenite-biulithic" (c) shall be made in one layer 2 inches thick.

The materials, methods and workmanship employed in the construction of all the above shall conform to the plans and specifications for said work on file with the commissioner of public Works and Property of the city of Henderson.

Proposals shall be received on any or all of the aforesaid types of pavement.

SECTION 4. Catch basins, inlets and necessary drains for draining said

SECTION 5. All of said Green street between the south side of First street and the south side of Clay street, a width of 100 feet, having heretofore laid off as a public street and having been open to the unrestricted use of the general public for more than five consecutive years last past, the same is hereby declared to have been dedicated to the city as a public street, and to have been accepted by the city as such; and the city does hereby accept such dedication of such street and the said portion thereof as one of the public streets of the city of Henderson, and hereby declares the improvement of said street, as herein provided, to be a necessity.

SECTION 6. That the board of commissioners of said city shall let, by contract, the furnishing of all labor and materials and the construction of the aforesaid improvements, and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of said improvement, upon competitive bidding, to the lowest and best bidder, after the advertisement of the letting of said contract for two consecutive weeks in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city. The Mayor is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for proposals for furnishing all labor and materials and the construction of said improvement and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of such work.

The right to reject any and all improvements is hereby reserved to the said board of commissioners.

Proposals shall be received on any or all of the said types of pavement named in section 3 hereof.

Each bidder shall accompany his proposal by a certified check, payable to the city of Henderson, Kentucky, for a sum equal to five per cent. (5%) of the total amount of his bid, as a guaranty to insure compliance with his bid, and the same shall be forfeited to the city in the event the accepted bidder fails to comply with his bid and enter into the contract and bond herein required, within ten (10) days after said contract shall have been awarded to him and he shall have received notice thereof.

When any proposal has been rejected the check deposited therewith shall be returned to the bidder depositing the same.

All proposals shall state prices bid, both in words and figures, and shall be based upon the items and quantities furnished by the city engineer, and must be submitted on blank forms furnished by the city, and must be sealed when submitted.

Proposals will be received and publicly opened by the Mayor and commissioners at the time and place designated in the advertisement for proposals, and all proposals received shall be tabulated and compared and laid before the board of commissioners at some regular or special meeting thereof, for the acceptance or rejection of such bids.

SECTION 7. When any proposal shall have been accepted the bidder making the same shall, not later than ten (10) days after notice from the city so to do, enter into a written contract with the city by which the said bidder shall contract, covenant and agree, among other things, as follows, to wit:

To furnish all labor and materials, and construct said improvements and guarantee the same for a period of five (5) years from the date of acceptance of same;

To finish and complete the said improvements within the time specified in said plans, specifications and proposals;

To execute and deliver to the city a bond in a sum equal to sixty-six and two third per cent. (66-2/3%) of the total amount of such bid, as estimated by the city engineer with some solvent surety or guaranty company authorized to do business in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, as surety thereon, which said bond shall be approved by the board of commissioners of the city, conditioned that the contractor shall promptly begin, faithfully perform and fully complete all of said improvements and pay for all materials mentioned in said proposal and contract, and well and truly and in a workmanlike and substantial manner, and in accordance with the terms of said proposal, contract, plans, detailed drawings and specifications provided therefor, complete the said improvements; and faithfully and fully, and in each and every respect comply with the conditions contained in said proposal and contract; and pay all sums of money agreed to be paid for work and labor done in and about the performance of said contract, and save the city of Henderson harmless from all loss and damage on account thereof.

To guarantee the said improvements against defects in workmanship and materials for the full period of five (5) years from the date of acceptance of such work;

To indemnify the city of Henderson against loss or damage on account of any claim or award arising under the Workman's Compensation Law of the Commonwealth of Kentucky in the execution of such work;

To assume at his own expense the defense of any suit or claim against the city of Henderson growing out of or arising in connection with all or any part of said work, immediately upon receipt of notice from the city of the filing of any suit or claim against it on such account; to bear all the expenses of such defense; and to satisfy any judgement or award that may be obtained thereon against the city.

SECTION 8. The contract for said improvements shall be ratified by the board of commissioners of this city before the same shall be binding upon the city; and the city shall reserve the right to furnish other or additional surety on the bond provided for in the foregoing section at any time, at the cost and expense of the contractor.

The contractor to whom said work shall be awarded shall designate an agent who shall be a resident of the city of Henderson, upon whom process against any such contractor may be served, and upon or to whom any notice herein required may be served or given. The contractor shall state in his said contract the name and address of such agent, and shall at all times

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addressed to the last designated address of such agent, or to the contractor at the address stated in his proposal, and such notice shall constitute a notice to the contractor.

SECTION 9. That the improvement of said portion of Green street shall, except as herein otherwise provided, be made at the exclusive cost of the owners of real estate abutting on such improvements, respectively, and shall be apportioned among and assessed upon the lots or parcels of real estate abutting on such improvement, according to the number of front or abutting feet of each property owner; and tax shall be levied upon such lots or parcels of real estate for the payment of the costs assessed thereon, which tax shall be due and payable at the office of the treasurer of the city of Henderson upon the completion and acceptance thereof by the board of commissioners, as is provided by law, and no such property shall be exempt from such improvement tax.

That the cost of the improvement of the intersections of said street and portions thereof with other public ways, from property line to property line, shall be assessed against and paid for by the city of Henderson.

That any assessment for any street improvements as provided in this ordinance which exceeds one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) of the value of the lots or parcels of real estate upon which the assessment is made, shall, to the extent of such excess, be assessed against and paid by the city of Henderson, but the improvement shall be taken into consideration in fixing the value of such real estate.

SECTION 10. That the said improvements shall be made on the ten year payment plan, and when same shall have been completed and the cost thereof ascertained and reported to the board of commissioners, and the work shall have been accepted, and the engineer's estimate of the cost shall have been confirmed by the board of commissioners, it shall, by ordinance, apportion the cost of said work, less such part as shall be assessed against and paid by the city, equally among owners of abutting property on both side of the street improved, according to the number of abutting feet owned by them respectively; and shall assess and levy a local tax on the several lots or parcels of abutting property at a rate per abutting foot sufficient to produce the part of the cost of the improvement apportioned to such lots or parcels of property, and shall apportion and assess to the city such part of the cost for which it is liable,

The Mayor of the city shall cause the said assessment ordinance to be published one time in some newspaper of general circulation, published in said city.

Such local taxes shall, at the option of the said property owners, be payable in cash or in ten (10) annual installments, as provided by law.

The tax bills for such special assessments may, in addition to the other remedies provided by law, be sold and the collection thereof enforced in the manner provided by law for the collection of municipal taxes.

SECTION 11. That the liens provided by law to secure the payment of the cost of such part of said improvements as the owners of real estate abutting upon such improvements may be respectively bound for as hereinafter provided, shall be enforced as in the manner provided by law for the enforcement of such liens, and in the name of the contractor or other persons entitled thereto; but said city shall in no event be liable for any such costs, nor for the costs of any such improvements except as herein stated, and except to the extent of the funds actually paid to it as herein provided; and a failure to collect any such local assessment or taxes or installment thereof when due, shall create no liability against the city.

SECTION 12. That in payment for such work the city shall pay to the contractor, or other person entitled thereto, within thirty (30) days from the date of the publication of the assessing ordinance, such part of said improvements as is herein provided shall be paid by the city; and will also, at the same time, pay over all assessments which may have been paid in cash.

In order to provide a fund for the immediate payment of such part of the cost of said improvements as shall not be paid in cash, the board of commissioners shall issue and sell improvement bonds in anticipation of the collection of such part of the local taxes assessed and levied therefor as may not be paid within thirty days from the date of the publication of the assessing ordinance, in the manner and form provided by law. Said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent, payable semi-annually.

The Mayor shall advertise for bids for said bonds by notice, published in some newspaper of general circulation, published in said city, one time, at least ten days before the receipt of bids, and at the time and place designated in said notice the Mayor and commissioners shall receive sealed bids for said bonds. "AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED" An ordinance to regulate the use of streets, alleys and other public ways of the city of Henderson, Kentucky, by pedestrians and persons using vehicles thereon; and providing penalties for violation thereof, was read the second time and on motion of commissioner Haag seconded by commissioner Cunningham same was approved and adopted on its second and final reading.

Aye:- Hall, Haag, Cunningham. three ayes:

The Mayor declared the said ordinance approved and adopted on its second and final reading.

Said ordinance is here copied as follows to wit:

An ordinance to regulate the use of streets, alleys and other public ways of the city of Henderson, Kentucky, by pedestrians and persons using vehicles thereon; and providing penalties for violations thereof.

Be it ordained by the board of commissioners of the city of Henderson, Kentucky:

Application of Ordinance.

SECTION 1. That the operators, drivers or persons in charge of any vehicle, as hereinafter described, horses or other domestic animals, street or interurban cars, and all pedestrians on street of the city of Henderson, Ky., shall conform to and observe the following rules and regulations upon the streets, alleys and public ways in said city.

Definition of Terms.

SECTION 2. (a) The word "Vehicle" as used in this ordinance shall include any contrivance used or capable of being used as a conveyance or means of transportation on land, excepting baby carriages and street and interurban cars.

(b) All provisions as to riding, driving or leading horses over the streets of the city shall apply alike to any other domestic animal.

(c) The word "street" shall include all streets, alleys, park roads and other public places in said city unless specially limited by context of this ordinance.

BUSINESS DISTRICT.

SECTION 3. The term "Business district" as used in this ordinance included all that portion of the city bounded as follows: On the north by the south line of Fourth street; on the west by the west line of Water street; on the east by the east line of Ingram street; and on the south by the south side of Washington street.

PEDESTRIANS CROSSING STREETS.

SECTION 4 (a) Pedestrians crossing any street at the intersections thereof with another street within the business district shall pass over such portion of the street as is included within the lines of the sidewalk projected, and not diagonally; and when crossing at streets where traffic officers are stationed, shall not cross when signalled by the traffic officer in charge of such crossing not to do so. Pedestrians shall pass to the right in passing others from an opposite direction and to the left in overtaking others.

(b) Any person who shall refuse to obey any lawful order of a traffic officer at any such crossing, or who shall use such crossing in violation thereof, and shall thereby in any manner hinder or interfere with any other person lawfully using the streets, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be punished, upon conviction, as hereinafter provided.

DRIVING WHILE INTOXICATED FORBIDDEN.

SECTION 5. It shall be unlawful for any person while in an intoxicated

SIGNALS- HOW AND WHEN GIVEN.

SECTION 6. (a) Drivers of vehicles desiring to turn to the left shall extend the arm in a horizontal position and slowdown.

(b) If desiring to turn to the right extend the arm and raise it at an angle of forty-five degrees and slow down.

(c) If desiring to stop, extend the arm in a horizontal position and move it up and down in a vertical position.

TURNING VEHICLES.

SECTION 7. (a) No vehicle shall be turned within the business district except at street intersections; and no vehicle shall be turned at all unless the driver thereof shall previously have given a signal by hand or other signaling device, visible to drivers following such vehicle, indicating the direction in which the turn is to be made.

(b) Every person in charge of a vehicle shall turn to the right of the street or road when signaled by a vehicle from behind, desiring to pass.

VEHICLES HAVING RIGHT OF WAY.

SECTION 8. (a) Police and fire department, fire patrol, United States mail service vehicles and public ambulances shall have the right of way in any street.

(b) Upon the approach of any fire apparatus, police patrol or public ambulance, every vehicle shall draw up as near as practicable to the right curb of the street until such apparatus, patrol or ambulance shall have passed; and the motorman or conductor of an interurban or street car shall immediately stop his car and keep it stationary upon the approach of any fire apparatus, police patrol, or ambulance.

(c) Street and interurban cars shall have the right of way between cross streets over all other vehicles, except as provided in sub-section (a) hereof.

(d) The driver or person in control of any vehicle upon a track in front of a street or interurban car shall turn out promptly upon the signal of the motorman or driver of the car.

VEHICLES MUST STOP FOR INTERURBAN AND STREET CARS.

SECTION 9. When overtaking a street or interurban car which is about to stop, or has stopped, to take on or discharge passengers, the driver of a vehicle shall stop the same far enough to the rear of such car to avoid interfering with such passengers.

DISCHARGING PASSENGERS.

SECTION 10. All street and interurban cars and passenger busses shall stop at the near side of the lateral intersection street for the purpose of taking on and discharging passengers, and shall not stop at any other place at said street intersections.

HOW VEHICLES MUST BE DRIVEN.

SECTION 11. (a) Vehicles shall be driven on the portion of the street to the right of the center thereof, except where the right side of the street is in such a condition as to be impassable.

(b) Vehicles moving slowly shall keep as close as possible to the curb on the right, allowing more swiftly moving vehicles free passage to their left.

(c) The driver of a vehicle, upon meeting another vehicle or street car, shall pass such vehicle or car on the right. Vehicles overtaking other vehicles shall keep to the left of the overtaken vehicle in passing, and in the case of motor-driven vehicles shall, before passing, give a signal by the blowing of the horn or the ringing of a bell, of their intention so to do, except that vehicles overtaking a street car shall not pass to the left, but shall pass to the right thereof.

(d) Provided, that at a street intersection, when a driver of a vehicle has given the signal for a left turn, the driver of a vehicle approaching from the rear must pass on the right.

(e) A vehicle turning into another street to the right shall turn the corner as near to the right hand curb as possible.

(f) A vehicle, when turning to the left to enter an intersecting or connecting street, shall not turn until it shall have passed the middle of such intersecting or connecting street.

(g) Vehicles crossing from one side of the street to the other shall do so by turning to the left, so as to head in the same direction as the traffic on said street.

(h) It shall be unlawful for any vehicle to cut corners at gasoline filling stations except when leaving such stations after service thereat.

(i) At all street intersections, a vehicle shall have the right of way over vehicles approaching on its left, and shall yield the right of way to vehicles approaching on its right; except in cases where certain streets have been designated as boulevards. Traffic moving on the boulevard shall have the right of way over traffic on intersecting streets, and vehicles on such intersecting streets shall come to a stop before entering the street designated as a boulevard.

(j) No vehicle shall back to turn on any street in the business section, and no vehicle in the business section shall be permitted to turn between street intersections.

PARKING.

SECTION 12. (a) No vehicle shall be parked within six feet on either side of a fire hydrant.

(b) Vehicles shall not stand two or more abreast in any street, and no vehicles shall be left standing in front of or within fifteen feet of either side of a line projected to the curb line from the middle of a main entrance of any theater, including moving picture houses or public buildings except when taking on and discharging freight or passengers, and then only for such length of time as is necessary for such purpose.

(c) All vehicles parked in the business district, except on Second street from Water to Ingram streets, shall stand with the right front wheel at the curb and the vehicle at an angle to the curb approximating forty-five degrees. On Second street, from Water street to Ingram street, vehicles shall be parked in the center of the street, with the right hind wheel resting against the curb of the 18 foot driveways, and the vehicle shall extend at an angle of forty-five degrees. In other parts of the city all vehicles shall be parked parallel with the curb and at a distance not greater than six inches therefrom; and shall be so parked as to be not

(d) No vehicle shall be stopped with its left side to the curb.
 (e) No vehicle shall emerge from an alley, stable or garage or other area or building on to the sidewalk without first sounding a warning.

TRAFFIC SUBJECT TO POLICE REGULATION.

SECTION 13. (a) It shall be the duty of all owners of vehicles to remove them from streets which are by police order directed to be cleared at any certain hour, for any special occasion.

(b) The commissioner of Public Safety may prohibit parking in front of any property in the business section of the city, and shall give notice of the restriction of any such space from the parking area by appropriate signs or markings, and it shall thereafter be unlawful for any person to park such a vehicle in any such restricted place.

(c) The commissioner of Public Safety is empowered, whenever the same is necessary for the public safety or convenience, temporarily to close any street or part thereof to vehicular traffic or to vehicles of a certain description, or to divert the traffic thereof.

SPEED LIMIT.

SECTION 14. No person shall operate a motor vehicle upon the streets of said city at a greater speed than fifteen miles per hour in the business section nor at a speed greater than twenty miles in the residence section.

LIGHTS ON MOTOR VEHICLES.

SECTION 15. (a) Every motor-driven vehicle, when operated upon the streets within the period of thirty minutes after sunset and thirty minutes before sunrise, shall display two white lights on the front and one red light on the rear thereof. Provided, that motorcycles shall display one white light in front and one red light in the rear.

(b) It shall be unlawful for any motor driven vehicle or motorcycle to be operated on said streets with lights which concentrate and project any part of the light into a beam unless the said lighting device is so adjusted that at a point a distance of seventy-five feet in front of said vehicle no part of the reflected beams of light from said lighting device shall be visible more than three feet above the surface of the street.

DANGER SIGNALS ON PROTRUDING LOADS.

SECTION 16. Every vehicle so loaded that any material protrudes more than four feet to the side or rear thereof shall carry a light at the projecting end of such material during the period of one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise, and at other times a red flag attached to the projecting end thereof.

LOAD LIMIT.

SECTION 17. Motor propelled trucks and other vehicles, the total weight of which when loaded exceeds five tons, shall not be permitted to be operated over the improved streets in said city; and the commissioner of public property of said city is empowered to designate such streets as may be used by such trucks and vehicles.

TRACTORS AND ROUGH-TIRED VEHICLES

FORBIDDEN TO USE OF IMPROVED STREETS.

SECTION 18. Tractors or other rough tired vehicles are forbidden to use any of the improved streets in the city

HORSE-DRAWN VEHICLES AT CURBS.

SECTION 19. Every horse attached to a vehicle and the shafts of unhitched vehicles, when backed up to the curb for the purpose of loading or unloading, shall be turned at right angles to the vehicle, or at as near this angle as possible and in the direction in which the traffic on that side of the street is moving.

DRIVING THROUGH PROCESSIONS FORBIDDEN.

SECTION 20. No person or vehicle, other than those of the city fire and police departments and city ambulances, acting in the course of their duties, shall drive, ride or be driven through a procession except with the permission of a police officer.

SAFETY ZONES.

SECTION 21. (a) The streets within three hundred feet of all schools located within the city are hereby declared zones of safety, except when such schools are closed. Drivers of vehicles thereon shall use every precaution for the protection of children, and shall travel through such zones of safety at a speed not to exceed ten miles per hour.

(b) The commissioner of public safety shall have the right to set apart certain portions of the streets in the business district as safety zones for pedestrians, and when so set apart and indicated by white lines or other distinguishing marks it shall be unlawful for any one to drive a vehicle within such safety zones.

CUT OUTS FORBIDDEN.

SECTION 22. Every motor vehicle using gasoline or other explosive mixture as a motive power shall use a muffler, which shall be sufficient to deaden the sound of the explosion, and such muffler shall not be disconnected or cut out while such motor vehicle is being operated upon any street within the city of Henderson.

MIRRORS ON TRUCKS AND PASSENGER CARRYING VEHICLES.

SECTION 23. All trucks and passenger carrying vehicles other than pleasure cars must be equipped with a mirror on the driver's side of the car.

OPERATION OF MOTOR VEHICLES BY INFANTS.

SECTION 24. No person under sixteen years of age shall operate any motor driven vehicle upon the streets of the city unless accompanied by the owner thereof, or some person over twenty-one years of age.

PENALTIES.

SECTION 25. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$5.00 for the first offense, and not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$50.00 for each subsequent offense.

SECTION 26. If any section or subsection of this ordinance shall be declared invalid for any reason, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

SECTION 27. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 28. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its second and final passage.

BE IT RESOLVED; That the city of Henderson charge the said Indiana Construction Company the sum of One Thousand dollars for said defaults, and deduct that amount from the balance due said company on account of the cost of said improvement assessable against the city.

An Ordinance providing for the improvement of O'Byrne street from Letcher to Mill street. 2nd reading.

An Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance providing for the improvement of the north and south sides of O'Byrne street, between the west side of Letcher street and the east side of Mill street, in the city of Henderson, Kentucky, and providing for the payment thereof, was read the second time and on motion of commissioner Cunningham seconded by commissioner Haag said ordinance was approved and adopted on its second and final reading.

Aye: Hall, Haag, Cunningham. three ayes:

The Mayor declared the said ordinance approved and adopted on its second and final reading.

Said Ordinance is here copied as follows to wit:

An Ordinance providing for the improvement of the north and south sides of O'Byrne street, between the west side of Letcher street and the east side of Mill street, in the city of Henderson, Kentucky; and providing for the payment thereof.

Be it ordained by the Board of commissioners of the city of Henderson, Kentucky:

SECTION 1. That the unimproved portion of the north and south sides of O'Byrne street, between the west side of Letcher street and the east side of Mill street, beginning at a point in the east property line of Mill street; running thence in an easterly direction with the north property line of O'Byrne street to a point in the west property line of Letcher street and for a distance of 10 feet out from said property line toward the center of said street, and beginning at a point in the east property line of Mill street, and thence in an easterly direction with the south property line

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towards the center of said street, be improved by the construction of an artificial stone pavement, except in front of the property of Earl Sheffer, on the north side of O'Byrne street.

The grades for said sidewalks are hereby fixed and established as follows, to wit:

Sidewalk grades for north side: Beginning at a point in the east line of Mill street at an elevation of 77.9; thence along the north property line of O'Byrne street in an easterly direction 150 feet to an elevation of 80.8; thence 150 feet to an elevation of 86.5 feet; thence 50 feet to an elevation of 88.3 feet; thence 100 feet to an elevation of 89.5 feet. a point in the west line of Letcher street.

Sidewalk grades for south side: Beginning in the east line of Mill street at an elevation of 78.5 feet; thence along the south property line of O'Byrne street in an easterly direction 150 feet to an elevation of 80.8 feet thence 200 feet to an elevation of 87.8 feet; thence 100 feet to an elevation of 88.6 feet.

The said improvements shall be constructed so as to conform as nearly as practicable to the above grades.

SECTION 2. Said sidewalks shall be constructed of concrete, four feet in width, except that portion of the street in front of the property of Earl Sheffer, on the north side thereof, which has heretofore been improved, and shall in all respects be of the kind, quality and dimensions and the materials mentioned and described in section 3, specifications No. 2, and sub-section thereunder of an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance providing the kind and character of sidewalks, curbing and guttering to be hereafter used in the city of Henderson, Kentucky, and prescribing specifications for same", which was passed on its second reading by the board of commissioners of said city on the 30th day of September 1922, and is of record in the office of the clerk of said city in ordinance book No. 5 at page 177.

There shall be left for grass plots all the space between the property line and the curb and gutter which is not occupied by the sidewalk, curb and gutter.

SECTION 3. Sections Nos. 1, 2, 7, 8, 9, and 10 of the aforesaid ordinance are also herein referred to and made parts of this ordinance.

SECTION 4. That the entire cost and expense of the aforesaid sidewalks, including the work and the furnishing of the materials as provided for in this ordinance, shall be paid by the owners of the property abutting on the side of the street on which the improvement is made, each corner lot having its sidewalk intersection included in its frontage, and the said costs apportioned among said owners according to the number of abutting feet owned by them respectively. Provided, that when the cost of said improvement assessed against any lot or parcel of real estate or owner thereof exceeds one-half of the value of such lot or parcel of real estate, such excess shall be paid out of the general fund of the city of Henderson, but the improvement shall be taken into consideration in fixing the value of such real estate.

SECTION 5. That the improvement provided for in this ordinance shall be made on the ten year plan, and paid for in ten annual instalments, as provided for by section 3458 of the Act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, entitled: "An act to amend and re-enact sections three thousand four hundred and forty nine; three thousand four hundred and fifty; three thousand four hundred and fifty one; three thousand four hundred and fifty two; three thousand four hundred and fifty three; three thousand four hundred and fifty four; three thousand four hundred and fifty five; three thousand four hundred and fifty six; three thousand four hundred and fifty seven; three thousand four hundred and fifty eight; three thousand four hundred and fifty nine of the Kentucky Statutes relating to the control and improvement of public streets, alleys, sidewalks, roads, lanes, avenues, highways and thoroughfares in cities of the third class," which was approved by the Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky on March 7, 1916, and which is chapter 10 of the act of the general assembly of Kentucky of 1916.

The work provided for herein shall be done by contract, let by said city upon competitive bidding, to the lowest and best bidder, after advertisement for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published in the city of Henderson, Ky., the said city reserving the right to reject any and all bids, and each bidder shall be required to accompany his bid with a cash deposit of \$100.00 with the city clerk of said city or by a certified check for that amount, payable to the said city, as guaranty of his good faith to insure compliance with his bid, and which amount shall be forfeited to said city in the event his bid is accepted, and he shall fail to comply with his bid and enter into a satisfactory contract and bond for the construction of said work and the furnishing of said material. The bond for said work is hereby fixed at a sum equal to one-half the estimated contract price, and the contract made hereunder shall stipulate a guarantee by the contractor of said work for five years from its acceptance by the board of commissioner

SECTION 6: All ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its second and final passage.
