Copy of Resolution.

WHEREAS the east and west sides of Adams street between the north line of Third street and the south line of Fourth street in the city of Henderson, Ky., have never heretofore been improved by the construction of an artificial stone pavement and combined curb and gutter thereon, except the pavement and combined curb and gutter on the east side of said Adams street between Third and Fourth streets in front of the property owned by the Louisville & Nashville Railroad Co., and there exists a necessity for said improvements Therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of commissioners of the city of Henderson, Ky that the east and west sides of Adams street between the north line of Third street and the south line of Fourth street, in the city of Henderson, Ky., be improved, as follows:

By the construction of an artificial stone pavement and combined curb and gutter thereon, except the pavement and combined curb and gutter on the East side of the said street in front of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad Co.

The aforesaid pavement shall occupy a space 5 feet in width; and the aforesaid curb and gutter shall occupy a space 30 inches in width and shall be constructed in all respects of the kind, quality and dimensions and of the materials mentioned and described in the general specifications for sidewalks, curb and gutter provided for in the ordinance in force at the time of the letting of the contract for the aforesaid improvements.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the said improvements be and the same are hereby declared to be a necessity, and after due publication of this resolution, as by law required, that an ordinance be drawn providing for such improvements and be presented to the Board of commissioners of said city for its consideration and action thereon.

" AN ORDINANCE providing for the improvement of Green street, in the city of Henderson, Ky., from the south margin of Third street to the north margin of First street, and between the curb and gutter lines on the East and West sides thereof, and providing for the payment of such improvement, was on motion of commissioner Cunningham, seconded by commissioner Haag placed on its second reading.

The Mayor declared the motion carried and ordered said Ordinance be placed on its second and final reading.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED

"AN ORDINANCE providing for the improvement of Green street, in the city of Henderson, Ky., from the south margin of Third street to the north margin of First street, and between the curb and gutter lines on the East and West sides thereof, and providing for the payment of such improvement, was read the second time and on motion of commissioner Cunningham, seconded by commissioner Haag, same is approved and adopted on its second and final reading.

The Mayor declared said Ordinance approved and adopted on its second and final passage. *Said ordinance is as follows, viz:*

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of the city of Henderson, Ky., as follows, to wit:

"The right to reject any and all improvements is hereby reserved to the said Board of Commissioners.

"Proposals shall be received on any or all of the said types of pavement named in section III hereof.

"Each bidder shall accompany his proposal by a certified check, payable to the city of Henderson, Kentucky for a sum equal to five per cent. (5%) of the total amount of his bid, as a guaranty, to insure compliance with his bid, and the same shall be forfeited to the city in the event the accepted bidder fails to comply with his bid and enter into the contract and bond herein required, with ten (10) days after said contract shall have been awarded to him and he shall have received notice thereof.

Said Ordinance is here copied as follows, Viz:

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING for the improvement of Main street in the city of Henderson, Ky., from the south margin of Fourth street to the north margin of First street, and between the curb and gutter lines on the East and West sides thereof; and providing for the payment of such improvement.

SECTION 111. Said pavement is to be constructed, of one of the following types, (a) sheet asphalt, (b) asphaltic concrete, or (c) "Warrenite-Bitulithic" on a portland cement foundation or on an asphaltic concrete foundation.

Said sheet asphalt (a) shall be made in two layers consisting of a lower or binder course, $\frac{1}{2}$ inches thick and an upper or wearing course, $\frac{1}{2}$ inches thick. Said asphaltic concrete (b) and "Warrenite- Bitulithic" (c) shall be made one layer two inches thick.

All of said Main street, between the south margin of Fourth street and the north margin of First street, a width of one hundred feet, having been heretofore laid off as a public street and having been open to the unrestricted use of the general public for more than five consecutive years last past, the same is hereby declared to have been dedicated to the city as a public street, and to have been accepted by the city as such; and the city does hereby accept such dedication of said street and the paid portion thereof as one of the public streets of the city of Henderson; and hereby declares the improvement of said street, as herein provided, to be a necessity.

SECTION VI. That the Board of commissioners of said city shall let, by contract, the furnishing of all labor and materials and the construction of the aforesaid improvements, and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of said improvement, upon competitive bidding, to the lowest and best bidder, after the advertisement of the letting of said contract for two consecutive weeks in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city. The Mayor is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for proposals for furnishing all labor and materials and the construction of said improvement and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of such work.

When any proposal has been rejected the check deposited therewith shall be returned to the bidder depositing the same.

All proposals shall state prices bid, both in words and figures, and shall be based upon the items and quantities furnished by the city engineer, and must be submitted on blank forms furnished by the city, and must be sealed when submitted.

SECTION VII. When any proposal shall have been accepted the bidder making the same shall, not later than ten (10) days after notice from the city so to do, enter into a written contract with the city, by which the said bidder shall contract, covenant and agree, among other things, as follows, to wit:

To furnish all labor and materials, and construct said improvements and guarantee the same for a period of five (5) years from the date of acceptance of same;

To finish and complete the said improvements within the time specified

As estimated by the city engineer, with some solvent surety or guaranty company authorized to do business in the commonwealth of Kentucky, as surety thereon, which said bond shall be approved by the Board of Commissioners of the city, conditioned that the contractor shall promptly begin, faithfully perform and fully complete all of said improvements and pay for all materials mentioned in said proposal and contract, and well and truly, and in a workmanlike and substantial manner, and in accordance with the terms of said proposal, contract, plans, detailed drawings and specifications provided therefore, complete the said improvements and faithfully and fully, and in each and every respect comply with the conditions contained in said proposal and contract; and pay all sums of money agreed to be paid for work and labor done in and about the performance of said contract, and save the city of Henderson harmless from all loss and damage on account thereof;

To guarantee the said improvements against defects in workmanship and materials for the full period of five (5) years from the date of acceptance of such work;

To indemnify the city of Henderson against loss or damage on account of any claim or award arising under the Workmen's Compensation Law of the commonwealth of Kentucky in the execution of such work;

To assume at his own expense the defense of any suit or claim against the city of Henderson growing out of or arising in connection with all or any part of said work, immediately upon receipt of notice from the city of the filing of any suit or claim against it on such account; to bear all the expenses of such defense; and to satisfy any judgment or award that may be obtained thereon against the city.

SECTION VIII. The contract for said improvements shall be re-affirmed by the Board of Commissioners of this city before the same shall be binding upon the city; and the city shall reserve the right to furnish other or additional surety on the bond provided for in the foregoing section at any time, at the cost and expense of the contractor.

The contractor to whom said work shall be awarded shall designate an agent, who shall be a resident of the city of Henderson, upon whom process against any such contractor may be served, and upon or to whom any notice herein required may be served or given, the contractor shall state in his said contract the name and address of such agent; and shall at all times during the life of such contract and bond maintain in the city such an agent, and shall give the city written notice of any change in the address of such agent. If such agent be not found in the city at any time any notice which otherwise would be served upon or given to him may be given by registered mail, addressed to the last designated address of such agent, or to the contractor at the address stated in his proposal, and such notice shall constitute a notice to the contractor.

SECTION IX. That the improvement of said portion of Main street shall, except as herein otherwise provided, be made at the exclusive cost of the owners of real estate abutting on such improvements respectively, and shall be apportioned among and assessed upon the lots or parcels of real estate abutting on such improvement, according to the number of front or abutting feet of each property owner; and tax shall be levied upon such lots or parcels of real estate for the payment of the costs assessed thereon, which tax shall be due and payable at the office of the Treasurer of the city of Henderson upon the completion and acceptance thereof by the Board of Commissioners, as is provided by law, and no such property shall be exempt from such improvement tax.

That the cost of the improvement of the intersections of said street and portions thereof with other public ways, from property line to property line, shall be assessed against and paid for by the city of Henderson.

That the cost of improvement of that portion of Main street between the rails of the Henderson Traction Company and for a distance of 12 inches on the outside of the line of the said rails, shall be made at the expense of the said Henderson Traction Company and shall be assessed against said company. Such tax shall constitute a first lien upon all of the property, assessments and franchises whatsoever, of said company, within the corporate limits of the city of Henderson, and shall be due and payable at the time and in the same manner, and shall bear like interest, as the assessments herein levied against the abutting property owners; but said company shall have the right to elect to construct its own part of said improvements as herein provided and if it shall do so, and construct its own part of said improvements, then no assessments shall be assessed against said company for the improvements herein provided for.

That any assessment for any street improvement as provided in this ordinance which exceeds one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) of the value of the lots or parcels of real estate upon which the assessment is made, shall, to the extent of such excess, be assessed against and paid by the city of Henderson, but the improvement shall be taken into consideration in fixing the value of such real estate.

SECTION X. That the said improvements shall be made on the ten year (10) payment plan, and when same shall have been completed and the cost thereof ascertained and reported to the Board of Commissioners, and the work shall have been accepted, and the engineer's estimate of the cost shall have been confirmed by the Board of Commissioners, it shall by ordinance apportion the cost of said work, less such part as shall be assessed against and paid by the city, equally among the owners of abutting property on both sides of the street improved, according to the number of abutting feet owned by them respectively, and the Henderson Traction Company, according to the portion of the street occupied by its line of railway and a distance of 12 inches out from the outside of each line of rails, and shall assess and levy a local tax on the several lots or parcels of abutting property and said company, at a rate per abutting foot sufficient to produce the part of the cost of the improvement apportioned to such lots or parcels of property and at a rate per cubic yard sufficient to produce the part of the cost of the improvement apportioned to said company, and shall apportion and assess to the city such part of the cost for which it is liable.

The Mayor of the city shall cause the said assessing ordinance to be

Such local taxes shall, at the option of the said property owners, be payable in cash or ten (10) annual installments, as provided by law.

The tax bills for such special assessments may, in addition to the other remedies provided by law, be sold and the collection thereof enforced in the manner provided by law for the collection of municipal taxes.

SECTION XI. That the liens provided by law to secure the payment of the cost of such part of said improvements may be respectively bound for as hereinafter provided, shall be enforced as in the manner provided by law for the enforcement of such liens, and in the name of the contractor or other persons entitled thereto; but said city shall in no event be liable for any such costs, nor for the costs of any such improvements except as herein stated, and except to the extent of the funds actually paid to it as herein provided; and a failure to collect any such local assessment or taxes or installment thereof when due, shall create no liability against the city.

SECTION XII. That in payment for such work the city shall pay to the contractor, or other person entitled thereto, within thirty (30) days from the date of the publication of the assessing ordinance, such part of said improvements as is herein provided shall be paid by the city; and will also, at the same time, pay over all assessments which may have been paid in cash.

In order to provide a fund for the immediate payment of such part of the cost of said improvements as shall not be paid in cash, the Board of Commissioners shall issue and sell improvement bonds in anticipation of the collection of such part of the local taxes assessed and levied therefor as may not be paid within thirty (30) days from the date of the publication of the assessing ordinance, in the manner and form provided by law. Said bonds when executed shall be delivered to the city treasurer for safe keeping, and he shall be responsible therefore.

In case the said bonds be sold, the proceeds thereof shall be placed to the credit of the city, in a separate fund, and the contractor or other person entitled thereto shall be paid for such work out of the said fund. Should the bonds be not sold, the same shall be delivered to the contractor or other person entitled thereto. WHEREAS the Board of commissioners of the city of Henderson, Ky., has heretofore, to wit: on the 11 day of Dec, 1922, adopted a resolution designating Elm street from the south margin of Third street to the north margin of First street and between the curb and gutter lines on the East and West sides thereof, as a portion of said street to be improved, which said resolution set out in general terms the character and extent of the proposed improvement and declared such improvement to be a necessity, and was published in the Henderson Daily Cleaner, a newspaper of general circulation published in said city, on the 26 day of Jan, 1923, Now, Therefore:

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of commissioners of the city of Henderson, Kentucky:

The said Henderson Traction Company shall, at its own expense, place its tracks in proper grade and alignment as designated and approved by the city engineer.

The materials, methods and workmanship employed in the construction of all the above shall conform with the plans and specifications for said work on file with the commissioner of Public Works and Property of the city of Henderson.

SECTION 1V. Catch basins, inlets and necessary drains for draining said Elm street shall be constructed on said street, as shown on the plans and shall be made in the manner and of the materials specified and shown by the aforesaid plans and specifications.

SECTION V. All of said Elm street, between the south margin of Third street and the north margin of First street, a width of one hundred feet, having been heretofore laid off as a public street and having been open to the unrestricted use of the general public for more than five consecutive years last past, the same is hereby declared to have been dedicated to the city as a public street, and to have been accepted by the city as such; and the city does hereby accept such dedication of said street and the said portion thereof as one of the public streets of the city of Henderson; and hereby declares the improvement of said street, as herein provided, to be a necessity.

SECTION VI. That the Board of commissioners of said city shall let, by contract, the furnishing of all labor and materials and the construction of the aforesaid improvements, and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of said improvement, upon competitive bidding, to the lowest and best bidder, after the advertisement of the letting of said contract for two consecutive weeks in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city. The Mayor is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for proposals for furnishing all labor and materials and the construction of said improvement and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of such work.

The right to reject any and all improvements is hereby reserved to the said Board of commissioners.

Proposals shall be received on any or all of the said types of pavement named in section 111 hereof.

Each bidder shall accompany his proposal by a certified check, payable to the city of Henderson, Kentucky, for a sum equal to five per cent. (5%) of the total amount of his bid, as a guaranty, to insure compliance with his bid, and the same shall be forfeited to the city in the event the

When any proposal has been rejected the check deposited therewith shall be returned to the bidder depositing the same.

WHEN any proposal shall have been accepted the bidder making the same shall, not later than ten (10) days after notice from the city so to do enter into a written contract with the city, by which the said bidder shall contract, covenant and agree, among other things, as follows, to wit:

To furnish all labor and materials, and construct said improvements and guarantee the same for a period of five (5) years from the date of acceptance of same;

To finish and complete the said improvements within the time specified in said plans, specifications and proposals;

It shall be unlawful for any one to set up for fee or reward any billiard table, pool table, ten pin alley, bowling alley or shooting gallery, near-beer or soft drink stand in the city of Henderson with out first obtaining license therefor. Written application for said license shall be made at least ten days prior to the issuance thereof,

No license shall be issued for the running of a ten pin alley bowling alley, soft drink, billiard or pool room on any square in the city of Henderson if the majority of the citizens living in said square object thereto, and it shall be unlawful for any one having a license to keep such ten pin alley or bowling alley, or permit any person to roll therein after the hour of eleven o'clock P.M. or before the hour of seven o'clock A.M. Any one violating the provisions of this section shall be fined \$25.00 for each offense.

SECTION 7. Penalty for violation of Patent Medicine License. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation except a merchant or druggist selling at their place of business, or any transient person, to vend patent, secret or proprietary medicines, by whatever name called, without obtaining the license required herein. All persons, firms or corporations guilty of violating this provision of this ordinance shall be fined for each offense a sum not less than \$5.00 no more than \$10.00.

SECTION 8. Ferry License- Penalty for Violation. It shall be unlawful for any person, company or corporation to operate a ferry within the boundaries of the city without obtaining from the city a license so to do. Said license is fixed herein at \$ 100.00 per year. Any one violating the provisions of this section shall be fined \$ 10.00 for each day such business is operated.

SECTION 9. Photographers - Penalty. The term "Photographers" as used in sub-section 127 of section 1 of this ordinance, shall include all persons who shall take pictures or photographs for fee or reward, whether the business be carried on at a regular place in a building, tent or other structure, or whether the person so engaged therein goes about from place to place. Any person, firm or corporation who shall engage in the business of photographer or developer or finisher of pictures as herein defined without a license as herein imposed, shall upon conviction be fined \$5.00 for each offense.

SECTION 10. Scales. Any person who shall weigh any persons, goods or commodities for fee or profit upon any scales in the city of Henderson, shall pay the license fee mentioned in sub-section 144 hereof. Any person who shall do any weighing for profit in the city of Henderson without such license, shall, upon conviction, be fined \$10.00 for each offense.

SECTION 11. Penalties for failure to secure License. It shall be unlawful for any person, to engage in, pursue, or carry on any of the other businesses, occupations and professions mentioned in the first section and sub-section thereof, of this ordinance without obtaining licenses and paying the tax herein provided for. Any person mentioned in the first section of this ordinance, and for whom no special penalty has been hereinbefore provided, and who shall engage in such business, occupation or profession without obtaining such license and paying the tax herein provided, shall, upon conviction, be fined not less than \$ 5.00 and not more than \$ 100.00 for each offense, and each day the violation is continued shall constitute a separate offense, provided, that in no case shall a fine for any one violation be more than the amount of the license tax required and costs.

SECTION 12. Unlawful to Peddle without License. It shall be unlawful for any person to carry on the business of peddler, itinerant merchant or itinerant vendor of goods, to sell or offer to sell at retail, or to peddle or vend within the limits of the city of Henderson, other than at their regular places of business (the words "other than at their regular places of business" not applying to itinerant merchants) any goods, wares or merchandise of any description, without first obtaining a license of said city and paying the fees herein prescribed, the words "itinerant merchant" as used herein and as used in any ordinance of the city of Henderson, shall be construed to include all persons who shall, under cover of bona fide merchant, come into or take up a temporary residence in this state, for the purpose of disposing of any goods, wares or merchandise, whether at auction or otherwise, and the words "peddler" and "itinerant vendor of goods" shall be construed to include those persons who go from place to place in the city disposing of their goods, wares, or merchandise.

Provided, however, that this section or sub-section 124 of this ordinance shall not apply to farmers, gardeners, dairymen, butchers, and dealers or other persons who dispose of their own products, nor shall it apply to persons who are bona fide residents of the city of Henderson, who deliver and sell ice and coal in small quantities, though not being the manufacturer thereof, and who pay the wagon or vehicle license prescribed in this ordinance.

Any person or persons violating the provisions of this section shall be fined \$ 10.00 for each offense, and each sale made without a license shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 13. Penalty for operating Merry go Round without License. It shall be unlawful for any person to engage in or carry on in the city of Henderson the business of setting up or running a "flying dutchman" or merry go round without first obtaining from the city a license so to do. Any person violating the provisions of this section shall, upon conviction, be fined not less than \$ 5.00 nor more than \$20.00 for each offense, and each day or part thereof such business is so carried on shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 14. Lectures concern, show, etc. penalty for violations Each and every person making or giving a lecture, concert, minstrel, theatrical or other performance for profit or money shall first obtain a license therefor and pay the tax provided in this ordinance; for each violation of the provisions of this section of this ordinance the offender shall be fined not less than \$ 5.00 nor more than \$ 10.00 for each performance given; provided, however, that any person, firm or corporation owning or controlling a hall or theater in the city of Henderson may pay thereon an annual tax of \$ 75.00 and obtain a license which shall authorize all companies employed by it, or permitted to lecture or exhibit in such hall or

To theaters, concerts, theatrical or other performance, the proceeds of which are to be devoted to any religious or charitable purpose.

SECTION 15. Auctioneering without a License, Penalty. Any person or persons who shall without first obtaining a license from the city of Henderson, engage in the business of auctioneer or do any auctioneering in the city aforesaid, shall be fined not less than \$ 10.00 nor more than \$50.00 for each offense, and every sale so made shall be considered a separate offense. Any person who obtains a license as auctioneer may sell in any place or house in the city, where auctioneering is permitted, the goods of others; but such license shall not authorize him to auction upon the streets of the city. This section shall not apply to theaters, concerts, theatrical or other goods or property under order of courts, nor shall it apply to persons who having been in business in this city may desire to dispose of their goods with the intention of quitting business, provided the owner himself does the auctioneering.

SECTION 16. Bucket Shop, License for, Penalty for Violation, Any person, firm, company or corporation who shall establish, set up or cause to be set up or conducted, within the limits of the city of Henderson a bucket shop or grain exchange, or any business where futures are dealt in on margin, or where products are bought and sold on speculation without the intention of actual delivery, shall first obtain a license therefor as provided herein, which license shall in no case be granted for less than is charged for one year. For violation of the provision of this section the offender shall be fined \$ 100.00 and each day or fractional part thereof such business is conducted shall constitute a separate offense. The provisions of this section shall not apply to any business where there is in good faith intended an actual delivery of the property bought and sold.

SECTION 17. Bottling Establishments Penalty for Violations.

That any person who shall establish or carry on in the city of Henderson any bottling establishment for the purpose of putting up beer, wine, cider, pop, gingerale, mineral water or other drinks or beverages, without first obtaining a license therefor from the city, shall be fined \$ 5.00 for each day such establishment is continued.

SECTION 18. VEHICLES. That each person obtaining a license for a wagon, cart or dray, or other vehicle mentioned in sub-section 157 of this ordinance, shall place and keep constantly on same, in a conspicuous place a tin or metal plate with the figures " 1923" and the number of the wagon thereon, which the auditor shall deliver along with the license.

SECTION 19. PENALTY FOR FAILURE TO PAY LICENSE PROMPTLY. All license fees or taxes shall be due and payable on or before the first day of each year, by every person, firm, company or corporation then or thereafter carrying on the business or follow the calling, occupation or profession named in this ordinance, and it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, company or corporation to carry on the business, following the calling, occupation or profession without first having paid the license tax herein required for the same.

In addition to the penalties and the fines imposed in this ordinance for violation thereof, there shall be paid on all license fees or taxes which shall not be paid within thirty days after the same are due, a penalty of 5% on the amount of the license tax and upon all license taxes not paid under this ordinance within sixty days after the same are due a penalty of 10%, and upon all license taxes not paid hereunder within ninety days after the same are due, a penalty of 15% of the amount of the license fee or tax, which shall be paid at the same time the license fee or tax is paid, and the license shall not be issued until the penalty and license fees are paid.

SECTION 20. To secure the payment of the foregoing license fees, the City of Henderson shall have a lien upon all the property of the person, firm, company or corporation owing the same, for five years from the time the same is due and to the extent as other liens for taxes, which shall not be defeated by gift, devise, sale, alienation, or any means whatever; and nothing shall be exempt from levy and sale under the warrant therefor, nor under any execution therefor, if a judgment be obtained.

SECTION 21. Wherever the word "person" is used in this ordinance, the same shall be construed to mean "persons", "partnerships", and "corporations".

SECTION 22. All licenses herein provided be granted shall be granted by the city on the express understanding and agreement between the city and the person to whom such license is granted that in the event the holder of any city license for the privilege of doing business or practicing a profession in said city shall be convicted of a violation of the state or federal prohibition laws in connection with the operation of the business or practice of the profession for which the license was issued, that upon such conviction said license shall automatically be forfeited; provided, however, that in the event the licensee shall appeal from said conviction, that the license shall be suspended during the pendency of the appeal, and if the judgment of conviction be reversed, then, in that event the license shall automatically be reinstated.

SECTION 23. Conviction for Violation Does not Release Payment of License. The imposition of a fine or conviction for a violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall, in no event, release the party from the payment of the tax herein imposed.

SECTION 24. Tax to be Collected by Civil Process. In addition to the penalties herein imposed, the tax provided for in this ordinance may be collected from the person, or persons, from whom the same are due by civil action, in any of the courts of competent jurisdiction.

SECTION 25. Should any part of this ordinance less than the whole be declared invalid and void by any court of competent jurisdiction, the same shall not affect such parts of this ordinance as are binding and valid, but shall only apply to such parts as in that instance may be declared to be invalid and void.

SECTION 27. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its second and final passage and approval.

Said Ordinance is here copied as follows.

"AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED" AN ORDINANCE apportioning the cost of the work for the improvement on the East and West sides of Green street, between the south line of First street and the north line of Powell street, in the city of Henderson, Kentucky, by the construction of a combined concrete curb and gutter and concrete sidewalk thereon, & levying a local tax on the several lots or parcels of abutting property at a rate sufficient to produce the part of cost of the improvement apportioned to such abutting lots or parcels of property.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED

"AN ORDINANCE providing for the improvement of Green street, in the city of Henderson, Ky., from the south margin of Third street to the north margin of First street, and between the curb and gutter lines on the East and West sides thereof, and providing for the payment of such improvement."

BE IT ORDAINED BY the Board of Commissioners of the city of Henderson, Ky., as follows, to-wit:

Section 1. That an Ordinance entitled " An Ordinance providing for the improvement of Green street, in the city of Henderson, Ky., from the south margin of Third street to the north margin of First street and between the curb and gutter lines on the East and West sides thereof; and providing for the payment of such improvement." which was passed by the Board of commissioners on its second final passage on the 16 day of Sept 1922, and was approved by the Mayor and began a law on the 18 day of Sept. 1922, be amended in the following particulars. to-wit:

FIRST: By substituting for the words "asphaltic concrete pavement, on a concrete foundation", appearing in the sixth line of section 1 of said Ordinance, the words, "asphalt pavement," so that said section shall read as follows, to-wit:

"SECTION 1. That the following portions of Green street, in the city of Henderson, Kentucky, to-wit: from the south margin of Third street to the north margin of First street, and between the curb and gutter lines on the east and west sides thereof, be improved, by excavating, grading and draining the same, and by constructing and paving the same with asphalt pavement, as hereinafter provided, and by the construction of catch basins, inlets and necessary drains for draining said street, as hereinafter provided."

Second: By repealing section III of said Ordinance and adopting in lieu thereof as section III the following, to-wit:

" SECTION III. Said pavement is to be constructed of one of the following types: (a) sheet asphalt, (b) asphaltic concrete, or (c) "Warrenite-Bitulithic", on a portland cement concrete foundation or on an asphaltic concrete foundation.

"Said sheet asphalt (a) shall be made in two layers, consisting of a lower or binder course $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches thick and an upper wearing course $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches thick. Said asphaltic concrete (b) and "Warrenite-Bitulithic" (c) shall be made in one layer two inches thick.

"The materials, methods and workmanship employed in the construction of all of the above shall conform with the plans and specifications of said work on file with the Commissioner of Public Works and Property of the city of Henderson."

Third: By inserting as a new literary paragraph between the second and Third literary paragraphs in section VI of said Ordinance, the following to-wit:

" Proposals shall be received on any or all of the said types of pavement named in section III hereof." so that as amended, said section VI shall read as follows, to-wit:

Section VI. That the Board of commissioners of said city shall let, by contract, the furnishing of all labor and materials and the construction of the aforesaid improvements, and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of said improvement, upon competitive bidding, to the lowest and best bidder, after the advertisement of the letting of said contract for two consecutive weeks in some news-paper of general circulation published in said city. The Mayor is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for proposals for furnishing all labor and materials and the construction of said improvement and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of such work.

"The right to reject any and all improvements is hereby reserved to the said Board of Commissioners.

"Proposals shall be received on any or all of the said types of pavement named in section III hereof.

" Each bidder shall accompany his proposal by a certified check, payable to the city of Henderson, Kentucky for a sum equal to five per cent. (5%) of the total amount of his bid, as a guaranty, to insure compliance with his bid, and the same shall be forfeited to the city in the event the accepted bidder fails to comply with his bid and enter into the contract and bond herein required, with ten (10) days after said contract shall have been awarded to him and he shall have received notice thereof,

"When any proposal has been rejected the check deposited therewith shall be returned to the bidder depositing the same.

" All proposals shall state prices bid, both in words and figures, and shall be based upon the items and quantities furnished by the city engineer, and must be submitted on blank forms furnished by the city, and must be sealed when submitted.

"Proposals will be received and publicly opened by the Mayor and Commissioners at the time and place designated in the advertisement for proposals, and all proposals received shall be tabulated and compared and laid before the Board of commissioners at some regular or special meeting thereof, for the acceptance or rejection of such bids."

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Section 11. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its second or final passage.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Commissioners of the city of Henderson, Ky, held in the city building in the city of Henderson, Ky, Monday afternoon May 28th 1923 at 2 P.M.

Presiding Honorable Cley F. Hall, Mayor:-

The following commissioners were present and answered to their names: at roll call to wit: Commissioner John A. Cunningham, commissioner Frank S. Haag, all present.

The Mayor declared the commissioners convened in regular session.

The minutes of the regular meeting of May 21st, 1923 were read, and on motion of commissioner Cunningham, seconded by commissioner Haag same were approved and adopted as read.

The Mayor declared the minutes of the regular meeting approved and adopted as read.

" AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED". AN ORDINANCE providing for the improvement of that portion of Second street extended, in the city of Henderson, Ky., from the west line of the right of way of the Illinois Central Railroad Company to the eastern boundary line of said city, and between the north and south lines thereof; and providing for the payment of such improvement, was read the second time, and on motion of Commissioner Haag, seconded by commissioner Cunningham, same is approved and adopted on its second and final reading.

Aye:- Hall, Haag, Cunningham. three aye:-

The Mayor declared said Ordinance approved and adopted on its second and final reading.

Said Ordinance is copied as follows.

" AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED". AN ORDINANCE providing for the improvement of that portion of Second street extended, in the city of Henderson, Ky., from the west line of the right of way of the Illinois Central Railroad Company to the eastern boundary line of said city, and between the north and south lines thereof; and providing for the payment of such improvement.

WHEREAS the Board of commissioners of the city of Henderson, Ky., has heretofore, to wit, on the 5 day of September, 1922, adopted a resolution designating that portion of Second street extended between the west line of the right of way of the Illinois Central Railroad Company and the eastern boundary line of said city, and between the north and south sides thereof, as a portion of said street to be improved, which resolution set out in general terms the character and extent of the proposed improvement and declared such improvement to be a necessity, and was published in the Henderson Daily Gleaner, a newspaper of general circulation published in said city, on September 19, 1922:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of commissioners of the city of Henderson, Kentucky:

SECTION 1. That the following portions of Second street extended in the city of Henderson, Ky., to wit: from the west line of the right of way of the Illinois Central Railroad Company to the west line of the bridge across Cane Creek; and from the east line of the bridge across said creek to the eastern boundary line of said city, and between the north and south sides thereof, be improved by excavating, grading and draining the same, and by constructing and paving the same as herein provided; and by the construction of catch basins, inlets culverts and necessary drains, and draining said street as hereinafter provided.

SECTION 2. The surface of the paving provided for in section 1 hereof shall have a modified parabolic curve from the center line to its outside edges, and its center line shall conform to the following grade, which is hereby fixed and established as follows, to wit:

Beginning at a point on the west side of the right of way of the Illinois Central Railroad at an elevation of 59.1 feet above datum; and running in an easterly direction along the center line of the street a distance of 50 feet to an elevation 59.5 feet; thence a distance of 100 feet to an elevation of 58.5 feet; thence a distance of 100 feet to an elevation of 57.9 feet; thence a distance of 663.5 feet to an elevation of 55.6 feet at the west end of the Cane Creek bridge; thence a distance of 79.7 feet to an elevation 55.6 feet at the east end of Cane Creek bridge; thence a distance of 506.8

SECTION III. That portion of the improvement of said Second street extended from the west line of the right of way of the Illinois Central R.R.Co. to the east line of the bridge across Cance Creek shall be 24 feet in width; and that portion of the improvement of said Second street extended from the east line of said bridge to the eastern boundary line of said street shall be 20 feet in width.

SECTION IV. Said pavement shall be constructed of one of the following types: (a) Portland cement concrete pavement, (b) asphaltic concrete pavement or (c) "Warrenite-bitulithic" pavement, on a portland cement foundation or an asphaltic concrete foundation, in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor now on file in the office of the city engineer of said city; and the materials, methods and workmanship employed in the construction of said pavement shall conform to said plans and specifications.

SECTION V. Catch basins, inlets, and necessary drains for draining said Second street extended shall be constructed on said street, as shown on the plans and specifications therefor, and shall be made in the manner and of the material specified and shown by said plans and specifications.

SECTION VI. Said Second street extended, between the west line of the right of way of the Illinois Central R.R.Co. and the eastern boundary line of the city of Henderson, a width of approximately 50 feet, having heretofore been laid off as a public street and having been open to unrestricted use of the general public for more than five consecutive years last past, the same is hereby declared to have been dedicated to the city as a public street and to have been accepted by the city as such; and the city does hereby accept such dedication of said street and said portion thereof as one of the public streets of the city of Henderson; and hereby declares the improvement of said street, as herein provided, to be a necessity.

SECTION VII. That the Board of commissioners of said city shall let, by contract, the furnishing of all labor and materials and the construction of the aforesaid improvements, and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of said improvement, upon competitive bidding, to the lowest and best bidder, after the advertisement of the letting of said contract for two consecutive weeks in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city. The Mayor is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for proposals for furnishing all labor and materials and the construction of said improvement and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of such work. The right to reject any and all bids is hereby reserved to the said board of Commissioners.

Proposals shall be received on any or all of the said types of pavement named in section IV hereof.

Each bidder shall accompany his proposal by a certified check, payable to the city of Henderson, Kentucky, for a sum equal to five per cent (5%) of the total amount of his bid as a guaranty to insure compliance with his bid, and the same shall be forfeited to the city in the event the accepted bidder fails to comply with his bid and enter into the contract and bond herein required within ten (10) days after said contract shall have been awarded to him and he shall have received notice thereof.

When any proposal has been rejected the check deposited therewith shall be returned to the bidder depositing the same.

All proposals shall state prices, bid, both in words and figures, and shall be based upon the items and quantities furnished by the city engineer, and must be submitted on blank forms furnished by the city, and must be sealed when submitted.

Proposals will be received and publicly opened by the mayor and commissioners at the time and place designated in the advertisements for proposals and all proposals received shall be tabulated and compared and laid before the Board of Commissioners at some regular or special meeting thereof, for the acceptance or rejection of such bids.

SECTION VIII. When any proposal shall have been accepted the bidder making the same shall, not later than ten (10) days after notice from the city so to do, enter into a written contract with the city, by which the said bidder shall contract, covenant, and agree among other things as follows, to-wit:

To furnish all labor and materials and construct said improvements and guarantee the same for a period of five (5) years from the date of acceptance of same;

To finish and complete the said improvements within the time specified in said plans, specifications and proposals;

To execute and deliver to the city a bond in a sum equal to sixty-six and two-thirds per cent. (66-2/3%) of the total amount of such bid, as estimated by the city engineer, with some solvent surety or guaranty company authorized to do business in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, as surety thereon, which said bond shall be approved by the Board of Commissioners of the city, conditioned that the contractor shall promptly begin, faithfully perform and fully complete all of said improvements and pay for all materials mentioned in said proposal and contract, and well and truly and in a workmanlike and substantial manner and in accordance with the terms of said proposal, contract, plans, detailed drawings and specifications provided therefor, complete the said improvements; and faithfully and fully and in each and every respect comply with the conditions contained in said proposal and contract; and pay all sums of money agreed to be paid for work and labor done in and about the performance of said contract, and save the city of

materials for the full period of five (5) years from the date of acceptance of such work;

To indemnify the city of Henderson against loss or damage on account of any claim or award arising under the Workman's Compensation Law of the Commonwealth of Kentucky in the execution of such work;

To assume at his own expense the defense of any suit or claim against the city of Henderson growing out of or arising in connection with all or any part of said work, immediately upon receipt of notice from the city of the filing of any suit or claim against it on such account; to bear all the expense of such defense; and to satisfy any judgment or award that may be obtained thereon against the city.

SECTION IX. The contract for said improvements shall be ratified by the Board of Commissioners of this city before the same shall be binding upon the city; and the city shall reserve the right to furnish other or additional surety on the bond provided for in the foregoing section at any time, at the cost and expense of the contractor.

The contractor to whom said work shall be awarded shall designate an agent who shall be a resident of the city of Henderson, upon whom process against any such contractor may be served, and upon or to whom any notice herein required may be served or given. The contractor shall state in his contract the name and address of such agent, and shall at all times during the life of such contract and bond maintain in the city such an agent, and shall give the city written notice of any change in the address of such agent. If such agent be not found in the city at any time, any notice which otherwise would be served upon or given to him may be given by registered mail, addressed to the last designated address of such agent, or to the contractor at the address stated in his proposal, and such notice shall constitute a notice to the contractor.

SECTION X. That the improvement of said portions of Second street Extended shall, except as herein otherwise provided, be made at the exclusive cost of the owners of said real estate abutting on such improvements, respectively, and shall be apportioned among and assessed upon the lots or parcels of real estate abutting on such improvement according to the number of front or abutting feet of each property owner, and a tax shall be levied upon such lots or parcels of real estate for the payment of the costs assessed thereon, which tax shall be due and payable at the office of the treasurer of the city of Henderson upon the completion and acceptance of said improvements by the Board of Commissioners, as is provided by law, and no property shall be exempt from such improvement tax.

That the cost of the improvement of the intersections of said street and portions thereof with other public ways, from property line to property line shall be assessed against and paid for by the city of Henderson.

Where any assessment for any street improvement as provided in this ordinance exceeds one-half of the value of the lots or parcels of real estate upon which the assessment is made, such assessment to the extent of such excess shall be assessed against and paid by the city of Henderson; but the improvement shall be taken into consideration in fixing the value of such real estate.

SECTION XI. That the said improvements shall be made on the ten (10) year payment plan, and when same shall have been completed and the cost thereof ascertained and reported to the Board of Commissioners and the work shall have been accepted and the engineer's estimate of the cost shall have been confirmed by the Board of Commissioners, it shall, by ordinance, apportion the cost of said work, less such part as shall be assessed against and paid by the city, equally among the owners of abutting property on both sides of the street improved according to the number of abutting feet owned by them respectively, and shall apportion and assess to the city such part of the cost for which it is liable.

The mayor of the city shall cause the said assessment ordinance to be published one time in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city.

Such local taxes shall, at the option of the said property owners, be payable in cash or in ten (10) annual instalments, as provided by law.

The tax bills for such special assessments may, in addition to the other remedies provided by law, be sold and the collection thereof enforced in the manner provided by law for the collection of municipal taxes.

SECTION XII. That the liens provided by law to secure the payment of the cost of such part of said improvements as the owners of real estate abutting upon such improvements may be respectively bound for, as hereinafter provided, shall be enforced as in the manner provided by law for the enforcement of such liens, and in the name of the contractor or other persons entitled thereto; but said city shall in no event be liable for any such costs, nor for the costs of any such improvements except as herein stated and except to the extent of the funds actually paid to it as herein provided; and a failure to collect any such local assessment or taxes or instalment thereof when due shall create no liability against the city.

SECTION XIII. That in payment for such work the city shall pay to the contractor, or other person entitled thereto, within thirty (30) days from the date of the publication of the assessing ordinance, such part of said improvements as is herein provided shall be paid by the city; and will also at the same time, pay over all assessments which may have been paid in cash.

not be paid within thirty (30) days from the date of the publication of the assessing ordinance, in the manner and form provided by law. Said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of 6% per annum, payable semi-annually.

The mayor shall advertise for bids for said bonds by notice, published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city, one time at least ten (10) days before the receipt of bids, and at the time and place designated in said notice the mayor and commissioners shall receive sealed bids for said bonds. Each bidder shall accompany his bid by a certified check, payable to the City of Henderson, or by a bond with good surety, for the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to secure compliance with his bid; and the mayor and commissioners shall publicly open and compare all bids received at some regular or special meeting of the Board of Commissioners; and the board of commissioners reserves the right to reject any and all bids. Said bonds shall not be sold for less than par, and any interest that may have accrued thereon.

Said bonds when executed shall be delivered to the city treasurer for safe keeping, and he shall be responsible therefor.

In case the said bonds be sold, the proceeds thereof shall be placed to the credit of the city, in a separate fund, and the contractor or other person entitled thereto shall be paid for such work out of the said fund. Should the bonds be not sold, the same shall be delivered to the contractor or other person entitled thereto. The delivery of said bonds, either to the purchaser or to the contractor or to other persons entitled thereto shall be made by the city treasurer at his office in the city of Henderson, and such treasurer shall take receipts for same.

SECTION XIV. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its second and final passage.

Said Ordinance is as follows to-wit:

An Ordinance Providing for the Annual Tax Levies of the City of Henderson, Ky., for the year 1923.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Henderson, Ky:

SECTION I. That an ad valorem tax of 95 cents on each One Hundred dollars or value of all property and franchises assessed for taxation for city purposes for the year 1923 be and the same is hereby levied and directed to be collected on all property and franchises within the corporate limits of the city of Henderson, Ky., which said city has the right to tax under the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, together with all property and franchises assessed under the general laws of this Commonwealth, and which the city of Henderson has the right to tax, subject to taxation under the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, for state purposes, to be paid by the owners of said property respectively; and, in addition to the above, a head or personal tax of \$1.50 is hereby levied and ordered to be collected on every male inhabitant of said city, twenty-one years of age and over, who was residing in the city on the 10th day of January, 1923.

It is estimated that the above tax of 95 cents on the One Hundred dollars of valuation of property, together with the poll or head taxes, license taxes, back taxes and other income, will yield a revenue of \$159,400.00.

The said taxes mentioned in this section shall be used for the ordinary and other expenses of the city government, and for such public works as may be determined on, and are levied for, and shall be distributed to the following uses and purposes, and no other, to-wit:

This tax is levied by the authority of the Act of the General Assembly of Kentucky, entitled "An Act for the Government of cities of the Third Class" Approved June 14, 1893, and the several amendments thereto, since adopted.

SECTION II. That an ad valorem tax of 92 cents on each One Hundred dollars of value of the property within the corporate limits of the city of Henderson, Kentucky, which said city has the right to tax under the laws of this Commonwealth, together with all properties and franchises assessed under the general laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, and which the city has the right to tax, subject to taxation under the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky for state purposes, be and the same is hereby levied and ordered to be collected on said property assessed for taxation for the year 1923, including all corporations

The tax provided for in this section shall be devoted to and used for the payment of the yearly expenses of the white and colored schools of the city of Henderson, as provided for in the Act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, entitled "An Act to Repeal and Re-enact Sub-division IX of Article IV of Chapter 89 of Kentucky Statutes, Carrol's edition of 1915", etc., relating to the public schools of cities of the third class, passed at the 1920 regular session of said General Assembly, and approved March 22, 1920.

SECTION III. That an ad valorem tax of 18 cents on each One Hundred dollars of value of the property within the corporate limits of the city of Henderson, Ky., which said city has the right to tax under the laws of this Commonwealth, together with all properties and franchises assessed under the general laws of this Commonwealth, and which the city has the right to tax, subject to taxation under the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky for state purposes, be and the same is hereby levied and ordered to be collected on all said property assessed for taxation for the year 1923, including all corporations having their chief office or place of business in said city, and the franchises of same to be paid by the owners of said property respectively.

The tax provided for in this section shall be devoted to the payment of the interest on the bonded indebtedness of the city of Henderson, Ky.

This tax is levied by authority of the Act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, entitled "An Act for the Government of Cities of the Third Class, approved June 14, 1893, and an Act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky entitled "An Act to Authorize the City of Henderson to issue bonds to fund its present indebtedness" approved January 30, 1876.

SECTION IV. That an ad valorem tax of five cents on each One Hundred dollars of value of the property within the corporate limits of the city of Henderson, Ky., which said city has the right to tax under the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, together with all properties and franchises assessed under the general laws of this Commonwealth, and which the city has the right to tax, subject to taxation under the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky for state purposes, be and the same is hereby levied, and ordered to be collected on all said property assessed for taxation for the year 1923, including all corporations having their chief office or place of business in said city, and the franchises of same, to be paid by the owners of said property respectively.

The tax provided for in this section shall be devoted to and used to pay the expenses of the maintenance and upkeep and operation of the public library maintained in said city as is authorized and provided in an Act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, entitled "An Act to Provide for the establishment of a free library and reading rooms in cities and towns of the third, fourth, fifth and sixth classes" approved March 21, 1902, and an Act of said Assembly passed at its regular 1920 session, entitled "An Act relating to free public libraries in cities and towns of the third, fourth, fifth, and sixth class of this commonwealth, which became a law without the approval of the Governor.

The taxes provided under this section shall be paid into the city treasury and be kept in a separate fund to be known as the library fund.

SECTION V. The taxes provided for in the first section of this ordinance shall be paid by the collecting officer to the Treasurer of the city of Henderson, and his receipt taken therefor.

The taxes provided in the second section of this ordinance shall be paid by the collecting officer to the treasurer of the Board of Education of the city of Henderson and his receipt taken therefor.

The taxes provided for in the third section of this ordinance shall be paid by the collecting officer to the treasurer of the Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners and his receipt taken therefor.

The taxes provided for in the fourth section of this ordinance shall be paid by the collecting officer to the treasurer of the city of Henderson and his receipt taken therefor.

The Clerk of the city of Henderson shall within thirty days after the adoption of this ordinance make out tax receipts or bills containing the number and descriptions of the levies and a description of the property, the aggregate of the taxable property of each person, and the amount of the taxes due thereon, and he shall certify the correctness thereof over his official signature, and deliver said tax receipts to the Auditor of the city of Henderson and take his receipt therefor.

SECTION VII. The auditor of the city of Henderson shall from and after the time he receives the tax receipts herein mentioned proceed to collect taxes in accordance with the act of the General Assembly of this Commonwealth entitled "An Act for the government of cities of the Third Class", and the ordinance of the city of Henderson regulating and controlling the collection of taxes.

SECTION VIII. The several tax levies made and provided for in this ordinance shall apply to all persons and property, the listing of which has been omitted by the City Assessor, and to all persons and property which may hereafter be listed for taxation for or during the fiscal year 1923.

SECTION IX. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

An Ordinance providing for the improvement of the unimproved portion of Adams street, between Third and Fourth and reading.

An Ordinance providing for the improvement of the unimproved portion of the east and west sides of Adams street between the south line of Fourth street and the north line of Third street, in the city of Henderson, Ky. was read the second time, and on motion of commissioner Cunningham, seconded by commissioner Haag, said Ordinance was approved and adopted on its second and final reading.

Aye:- Hall, Haag, Cunningham. three ayes:-

The Mayor declared the said Ordinance approved and adopted on its second and final reading.

Said Ordinance is here copied as follows to wit:

"AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED". AN ORDINANCE providing for the improvement of the unimproved portion of the east and west sides of Adams street between the south line of Fourth street and the north line of Third street, in the city of Henderson, Ky.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of the city of Henderson, Kentucky:

SECTION 1. That the unimproved portion of the east and west sides of Adams street from the south line of Fourth street to the north line of Third street, beginning at a point in the south line of Fourth street opposite the property lines on the east and west sides of said Adams street, and extending along the property lines of the east and west sides of said Adams street between the points above named to a point 15 feet from the center line of Adams street, be improved by the construction of an artificial stone pavement and combined curb and gutter thereon, except the pavement and combined curb and gutter on the east side of said Adams street between Third and Fourth streets, in front of the property owned by the Louisville & Nashville Railroad Company, and that said improvements be made as herein directed.

The grades for the property lines of said sidewalks, curbs and gutters are hereby fixed and established as follows to wit:

Grade for East side: Beginning at the intersection of the south line of Fourth street with the curb line on the east side of Adams street at an elevation of 70.6 feet above the city datum; running thence with the said east curb line in a southerly direction 510 feet to an elevation of 66.97 feet to the north line of Third street.

Grade for the west side: Beginning at the intersection of the south line of Fourth street with the curb line on the west side of Adams street at an elevation of 70.6 feet above city datum; and running thence in a southerly direction with the west line of Adams street 510 feet to an elevation of 67.17 feet to the north line of Third street.

The said improvements shall be constructed so as to conform as nearly as practicable to the above grades.

SECTION 2. Said sidewalk shall be constructed of concrete, five feet in width, except that portion of the street in front of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad Company's property, which has heretofore been improved,

"AN ORDINANCE providing the kind and character of sidewalks, curbing and guttering to be hereafter used in the city of Henderson, Kentucky, and prescribing specifications for same", which was passed on its second reading by the Board of commissioners of said city on September 30, 1922, and is of record in the office of the clerk of said city in Ordinance book No 5, at page 168. There shall be left for grass plots all the space between the property line and the curb and gutter which is not occupied by the sidewalk, curb and gutter.

SECTION 3. There shall also be constructed within the space above mentioned a combined concrete curb and gutter, 24 inches in width, of the materials and in the manner provided in section 5, specifications No 4 of the aforesaid ordinance, except in front of the said property of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad Company.

SECTION 4. Sections Nos 1, 2, 8 and 9 of the aforesaid ordinance are also herein referred to and made parts of this ordinance.

SECTION 5. That the entire cost and expense of the aforesaid side walks, curbing and guttering, including the work and the furnishing of the materials as provided for in this ordinance, shall be paid by the owners of the property abutting on the side of the street on which the improvement is made, each corner lot having its side walk intersection included in its frontage, and the said costs apportioned among said owners according to the number of abutting feet owned by them respectively. Provided that when the cost of said improvement assessed against any lot or parcel of real estate or owner thereof exceeds one-half of the value of such lot or parcel of real estate, such excess shall be paid out of the general fund of the city of Henderson, but the improvement shall be taken into consideration in fixing the value of such real estate.

SECTION 6. That the improvement provided for in this ordinance shall be made on the ten year plan and paid for in ten annual installments as provided for by section 3458 of the act of the general assembly of the commonwealth of Kentucky, entitled:

"An act to amend and re-enact sections three thousand four hundred and forty nine, three thousand four hundred and fifty, three thousand four hundred and fifty one, three thousand four hundred and fifty two, three thousand four hundred and fifty three, three thousand four hundred and fifty four, three thousand four hundred and fifty five, three thousand four hundred and fifty six, three thousand four hundred and fifty seven, three thousand four hundred and fifty eight, Three thousand four hundred and fifty nine of the Kentucky Statutes relating to the control and improvement of Public street, alleys, sidewalks, roads, lanes, avenues, highways and thoroughfares in cities of the third class", which was approved by the Governor of the commonwealth of Kentucky on March 7, 1916, and which is chapter 10 of the acts of the general Assembly of Kentucky 1916.

The work provided for herein shall be done by contract, let by said city upon competitive bidding to the lowest and best bidder, after advertisement for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published in the city of Henderson, Kentucky, the said city reserving the right to reject any and all bids, and each bidder shall be required to accompany his bid with a cash deposit of \$ 100.00 with the city clerk of said city or by a certified check for that amount payable to the said city, as guaranty of his good faith to insure compliance with his bid, and which amount shall be forfeited to said city in the event his bid is accepted, and he shall fail to comply with his bid and enter into a satisfactory contract and bond for the construction of said work and the furnishing of said material. The bond for said work is hereby fixed at a sum equal to one-half the estimated contract price, and the contract made hereunder shall stipulate a guarantee by the contractor of said work for five years from its acceptance by the Board of commissioners.

SECTION 7. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances conflicting herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 8. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its second and final passage.

Stolzy, have heretofore finished their work and have returned the tax book for said city for the year 1923 to the city clerk, as required by law, and have made report to the board of commissioners showing the completion of their work of supervising the assessments of property within said city for the year 1923, as made by the city assessor for said year, and the tax book has been submitted to the board of commissioners by said city clerk for their action thereon; and

WHEREAS, the Board of commissioners of Henderson, by a resolution adopted at their regular meeting held in the city on June 25, 1923, provided for the improvement of that portion of said intervening space from the east side of Water street to the west side of Ingram street by paving same with either sheet asphalt, bitulithic asphalt, concrete, brick, treated wooden blocks, Warrenite-Bitulithic, asphaltic concrete, or other bitulithic or bitulithic concrete paving, or other bituminous paving, and will hereafter adopt an ordinance providing for such improvement, leaving the aforesaid intervening strip from the east side of Ingram street to the west side of the right of way of the Illinois Central Railroad Company to be improved as provided in said original ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the city engineer has prepared in duplicate the grades, plans and specifications for the improvement of said intervening space from the east side of Ingram street to the west line of the right of way of the Illinois Central Railroad Company, which he has submitted to the Board of Commissioners of the city; and,

WHEREAS, said grades, plans and specifications have been examined and approved by said Commissioners; now, therefore,

The costs thereof shall be equally apportioned to the abutting property owners, and shall be apportioned among and assessed upon the lots or parcels of real estate abutting on such improvement, according to the number of front or abutting feet; provided that the cost of the improvement of the intersection of said street and portions thereof with other public ways, from property line to property line shall be assessed against and paid by the city of Henderson; and provided further, that the cost of the improvement of that portion of the street between the rails of the line of track of the Henderson Traction Company, and for a distance of 12 inches on the outside of each line of rails, shall be made at the expense of the said company, and shall be assessed against said company, except that said company shall have the right to elect to construct its own part of said improvements aforesaid, and in the event it does so construct said improvements no tax shall be assessed against it therefore. Said tax or assessments against the abutting property owners and the Henderson Traction Company shall be secured by the liens provided by law to secure the payment of the cost of such part of said improvements as the abutting property owners and the Henderson Traction Company may be respectively bound for, as in said ordinance and this resolution provided, and shall be enforced in the manner provided by law for the enforcement of such liens. Said improvements shall be made on the ten year payment plan, as in said ordinance provided and the provisions of said ordinance, so far as applicable when said improvements are made by the city of Henderson, as therein provided, are adopted as a part hereof, the same as if incorporated herein.
