BAKER-VANTER GROOVED LEAF

stallation of Current Meters for Cooking Purposes and Fixing the Rate for Same.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners for the City of Henderson that electric current be furnished every home, restaurant and business house for cooking purposes and supplying electric stoves and ranges where the maximum current consumption is 3 kw or over.

That the superintendent of the Electric light plant hereby is authorized to install the necessary meters or make the necessary connections for furnishing electric current to the homes restaurants and other places in the city of Henderson where electric power or current is used for cooking purposes.

The rate for current so used is as follows; For the first 30 kilowatts used per month .08¢ gross, .07¢ net per K.W. hour, for all over 30 K.W. .03¢ per K.W. hour net.

The meter to be read and the account for same made out and collected in the same manner and at the same time under the same conditions and subject to same discount as is now provided by ordinance for the collection of bills for the use of ordinary electric current, That is minimum account to be 75¢ net or \$1.00 gross per month.

This ordinance to be in force after its second and final reading.

An Ordinance ENTITLED, AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE, entitled; " AN Ordinance apportioning the cost of the improvement of that portion of Second Street Extended, in the City of Henderson, Kentucky, from the west line of the right of way of the Illinois Central Railroad Company to the east boundary line of said City, and between the north and south sides thereof, by the construction of a "warrenite-bitulithic" pavement On a Portland cement concrete foundation, and by the construction of man-holes, drains, catch-basins and inlets in connection therewith; and assessing and levying a local tax on the several lots or parcels of abutting property at a rate per abutting foot sufficient to produce the part of the cost of the improvement apportioned to such abutting lots or parcels of property; and as - sessing to the City of Henderson the cost of the improvement of street in- tersections ", which was adopted on its second and final passage, was approv- ed by the Mayor, and became a law on December 19, 1923. Whereas the afore- mentioned ordinance was read; and on motion of Commissioner Hart seconded by Commissioner Johnson, it is ordered, that same be approved and adopted on its first reading.

Mosely, being considered the best proposition, be accepted, and the City attorney is directed to draw a contract with him in accord therewith, and the Mayor is directed to execute same on behalf of the City.

The Mayor offered as an amendment to said motion; That the proposition of the Henderson Hospital be accepted, as the lowest and best bid, and that the City Attorney be directed to draw a contract in accord therewith and the Mayor directed to execute same on behalf of the City.

The Mayor declared his amendment lost for want of a second and put the original motion.

"

Section 3. Said pavement shall be constructed of one of the following types; (a) sheet asphalt, (b) asphaltic concrete, or (c) "Warrenite Bitulithic" on a portland cement concrete foundation, or on an asphaltic concrete foundation. Said sheet asphalt (a) shall be made in two layers, consisting of a lower, or binder course, one and one-half inches thick, and an upper, or wearing course, one and one-half inches thick. Said asphaltic concrete (b), and Warrenite Bitulithic (c) shall be made in one layer two inches thick. The materials, methods and workmanship employed in the construction of all the above shall conform to the plans and specifications for said work on file with the Commissioner of Public Works and City Engineer of the City of Henderson, which are made a part hereof, and are hereby approved and adopted. Proposals shall be received on any or all of the aforesaid types of pavement.

Section 4. Catch basins, inlets and necessary drains for

Section 5. All of said Main Street, between the south line of Jackson Street and the south line of Second Street, a width of 60 feet or more, having heretofore been laid off as a public street, and having been open to the unrestricted use of the general public for more than five consecutive years last past, the same is hereby declared to have been dedicated to the City as a public street, and to have been accepted by the City as such, and the City does hereby accept such dedication of said street, and the said portion thereof as one of the public streets of the City of Henderson, and hereby declares the improvement of said street as herein provided to be a necessity.

Section 6. That the board of commissioners of said city shall let, by contract, the furnishing of all labor and materials and the construction of the aforesaid improvements, and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of said improvement, upon competitive bidding, to the lowest and best bidder, after the advertisement of the letting of said contract for two consecutive weeks in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city. The Mayor is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for proposals for furnishing all labor and materials and the construction of said improvement and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of such work.

The right to reject any and all proposals is hereby reserved to the said board of commissioners.

Proposals shall be received on any or all of the said types of pavement named in Section 3. hereof.

Each bidder shall accompany his proposal by a certified check, payable to the City of Henderson, Ky., for a sum equal to five per cent (5%) of the total amount of his bid, as a guaranty to insure compliance with his bid, and the same shall be forfeited to the city as liquidated damages, in the event the accepted bidder fails to comply with his bid and enter into the contract and bond herein required, within ten (10) days after said contract shall have been awarded to him and he shall have received notice thereof.

Proposals will be received and publicly opened by the Mayor and Commissioners at the time and place designated in the advertisement for proposals, and all proposals received shall be tabulated and compared and laid before the board of commissioners at some regular or special meeting thereof, for the acceptance or rejection of such bids.

Section 7. When any proposal shall have been accepted the bidder making the same shall, not later than ten days after notice from the city so to do, enter into a written contract with the city by which the said bidder shall contract, covenant and agree, among other things, as follows, to-wit;

To furnish all labor and materials, and construct said improvements and guarantee the same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of same;

To finish and complete the said improvements within the time specified in said plans, specifications and proposals;

To execute and deliver to the city a bond in a sum equal to sixty-six and two-thirds per cent. (66-2/3%) of the total amount of such bid, as estimated by the city engineer with some solvent guaranty company authorized to do business in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, as surety thereon, which said bond shall be approved by the Board of Commissioners of the city, conditioned that the contractor shall promptly begin, faithfully perform and fully complete all of said improvements and pay for all materials mentioned in said proposal and contract, and well and truly, and in a workman-like and substantial manner, and in accordance with the terms of said proposal, contract, plans, detailed drawings and specifications provided therefor; complete the said improvements; and faithfully and fully, and in each and every respect comply with the conditions contained in said proposal and contract; and pay all sums of money agreed to be paid for work and labor done in and about the performance of said contract, and save the city of Henderson harmless from all loss and damage on account thereof.

To guarantee the said improvements against defects in workmanship and materials for the full period of five years from the date of acceptance of such work;

To indemnify the city of Henderson against loss of damage on account of any claim or award arising under the Workmen's Compensation Law of the Commonwealth of Kentucky in the execution of such work;

To assume at his own expense the defense of any suit or claim against the city of Henderson growing out of or arising in connection with all or any part of said work, immediately upon receipt of notice from the City of the filing of any suit or claim against it on such account; to bear all the expenses of such defense; and to satisfy and judgment or award that may be obtained thereon against the city.

Section 8. The contract for said improvements shall be ratified by the board of Commissioners of this city before the same shall be binding upon the city; and the city shall reserve the right to furnish or require other or additional surety on the bond provided for in the foregoing section at any time, at the cost and expense of the contractor.

The contractor to whom said work shall be awarded shall designate an agent who shall be a resident of the city of Henderson, upon whom process against any such contractor may be served, and upon or to whom any notice herein required may be served or given. The contractor shall state in his said contract the name and address of such agent, and shall at

any notice which otherwise would be served upon or given to him may be given by registered mail, addressed to the last designated address of such agent, or to the contractor at the address stated in his proposal, and such notice shall constitute a notice to the contractor.

Section 9. That the improvement of said portion of Main street shall, except as herein otherwise provided, be made at the exclusive cost of the owners of real estate abutting on such improvements, respectively, and shall be apportioned among and assessed upon the lots or parcels of real estate abutting on such improvement, according to the number of front or abutting feet of each property owner; and tax shall be levied upon such lots or parcels of real estate for the payment of the cost assessed thereon, which tax shall be due and payable at the office of the treasurer of the city of Henderson upon the completion and acceptance thereof by the board of commissioners, as is provided by law, and no such property shall be exempt from such improvement tax.

That the cost of the improvement of the intersections of said street and portions thereof with other public ways, from property line to property line, shall be assessed against and paid for by the city of Henderson.

That any assessment for any street improvement as provided in this ordinance which exceeds one-half of the value of the lots or parcels of real estate upon which the assessment is made shall, to the extent of such excess, be assessed against and paid by the city of Henderson, but the improvement shall be taken into consideration in fixing the value of such real estate.

Section 10. That the said improvements shall be made on the ten year payment plan, and when same shall have been completed and the cost thereof ascertained and reported to the board of commissioners, and the work shall have been accepted and the engineer's estimate of the cost shall have been confirmed by the board of commissioners, it shall, by ordinance, apportion the cost of said work, less such part as shall be assessed against and paid by the city, equally among the owners of abutting property on both sides of the street improved, according to the number of abutting feet owned by them, respectively; and shall assess and levy a local tax on the several lots or parcels of abutting property at a rate per abutting foot sufficient to produce the part of the cost of the improvement apportioned to such lots or parcels of property, and shall apportion and assess to the city such part of the cost for which it is liable.

The Mayor of the city shall cause the said assessment ordinance to be published one time in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city.

Such local taxes shall, at the option of the said property owners, be payable in cash or in ten (10) annual instalments, as provided by law.

The tax bills for such special assessments may, in addition to the other remedies provided by law, be sold and the collection thereof enforced in the manner provided by law for the collection of municipal taxes.

Section 11. That the liens provided by law to secure the payment of the cost of such part of said improvements as the owners of real estate abutting upon such improvements may be respectively bound for as hereinafter provided, shall be enforced as in the manner provided by law for the enforcement of such liens, and in the name of the contractor or other persons entitled thereto; but said city shall in no event be liable for any such costs, nor for the costs of any such improvements except as herein stated, and except to the extent of the funds actually paid to it as herein provided; and a failure to collect any such local assessment or taxes or instalment thereof when due shall create no liability against the city.

Section 12. That in payment of such work the city shall pay to the contractor or other person entitled thereto, within thirty (30) days from the date of the publication of the assessing ordinance, such part of said improvements as is herein provided shall be paid by the city; and will, also, at the same time, pay over all assessments which may have been paid in cash.

In order to provide a fund for the immediate payment of such part of the cost of said improvements as shall not be paid in cash, the board of commissioners, shall issue and sell improvement bonds in anticipation of the collection of such part of the local taxes assessed and levied therefor as may not be paid within thirty days from the date of the publication of the assessing ordinance, in the manner and form provided by law. Said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of six per centum, payable semi-annually.

The Mayor shall advertise for bids for said bonds by notice, published in some newspaper of general circulation, published in said city, one time, at least 10 days before the receipt of bids, and at the time and place designated in said notice the mayor and commissioners shall receive sealed bids for said bonds. Each bidder shall accompany his bid by a certified check, payable to the City of Henderson, or by a bond with good surety, for the sum of One Thousand Dollars, to secure compliance with his bid; and the Mayor and Commissioners shall publicly open and compare all bids received at some regular or special meeting of the board of commissioners; and the board of commissioners reserves the right to reject any and all bids. Said bonds shall not be sold for less than par and any interest that may have accrued thereon.

Said bonds when executed shall be delivered to the city treasurer for safe keeping, and he shall be responsible therefor.

In case the said bonds be sold, the proceeds thereof shall be placed to the credit of the city, in a separate fund, and the contractor or other person entitled thereto shall be paid for such work out of the said fund. Should the bonds be not sold, the same shall be delivered to the contractor or other person entitled thereto. The delivery of said bonds, either

An Ordinance ENTITLED, AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF NORTH MAIN STREET, from the South line of Fourth Street, to a point in Twelfth Street, Twenty-Nine feet north of the south gutter line, on the South side of said Twelfth Street; and Providing for the Payment of such Improvement., was read; and on motion of Commissioner Hart seconded by Commissioner Johnson, it is ordered, that same be adopted on its second reading.

Aye; -Hall, Hart, Johnson, three ayes,

The Mayor declared the ordinance approved and adopted on its second and final reading, which is as follows; to-wit;

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF NORTH MAIN STREET, FROM THE SOUTH LINE OF FOURTH STREET, TO A POINT IN TWELFTH STREET, TWENTY-NINE FEET NORTH OF THE SOUTH GUTTER LINE, ON THE SOUTH SIDE OF SAID TWELFTH STREET; AND PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF SUCH IMPROVEMENT.

WHEREAS the Board of Commissioners of the City of Henderson, Kentucky, has heretofore, to-wit; on ~~May 13~~ ^{May 13}, 1924, adopted a resolution designating North Main Street, from the South property line of Fourth Street, to a point in Twelfth Street; twenty-nine feet north of the south gutter line, on the South side of Twelfth Street, as a portion of said street to be improved, which resolution set out in general terms the character and extent of the proposed improvement; and declared such improvement to be a necessity, and was published in the Henderson Daily Gleaner, a newspaper of general circulation, published in said City, on the 21st day of May, 1924; Now therefore-----

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF the City of Henderson, Kentucky;

Section 2. The surface of the paving provided for in Section 1 hereof shall be flush with the gutters at the gutter lines on the east and west sides of said street where such gutters now exist, and shall be flush with the grades for said gutters at the gutter lines, on the east and west sides of said street, where the gutters have not been laid, and its center line shall conform to the following grades, to-wit;

Beginning at station 0. 0, being the intersection of the south property line of Fourth street with the center line of Main street, at an elevation of 77.30 feet above the city datum line, thence with the center line of Main street 75 feet to an elevation of 77.30 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 25 feet to an elevation of 77.6 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 75 feet to an elevation of 80.60 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 25 feet to an elevation of 81.30 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 300 feet to an elevation of 87.30 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 100 feet to an elevation of 89.10 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 100 feet to an elevation of 90.45 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 75 feet to and elevation of 91.20 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 75 feet to an elevation of 91.30 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 50 feet to an elevation of 91.08 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 125 feet to an elevation of 90.30 feet above said datum line;

center line of Main street 125 feet to an elevation of 92.20 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 25 feet to an elevation of 92.35 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 25 feet to an elevation of 92.20 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 100 feet to an elevation of 91.20 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 20 feet to an elevation 90.80 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 17.5 feet to an elevation of 90.35 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 20 feet to an elevation of 89.60 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 17.5 feet to an elevation of 89.40 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 300 feet to an elevation of 90.55 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 150 feet to an elevation of 91.40 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 100 feet to an elevation of 93.00 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 75 feet to an elevation of 95.82 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 50 feet to an elevation of 94.00 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 300 feet to an elevation of 92.50 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 75 feet to an elevation of 92.90 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 75 feet to an elevation of 93.80 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 25 feet to an elevation of 94.10 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 25 feet to an elevation of 94.50 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 25 feet to an elevation of 94.95 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 25 feet to an elevation of 95.48 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 25 feet to an elevation of 96.06 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 25 feet to an elevation of 96.70 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 25 feet to an elevation of 97.40 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 175 feet to an elevation of 103.20 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 50 feet to an elevation of 105.15 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 25 feet to an elevation of 105.91 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 25 feet to an elevation of 106.42 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 25 feet to an elevation of 106.65 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 50 feet to an elevation of 106.60 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 325 feet to an elevation of 104.85 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 50 feet to an elevation of 104.85 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 75 feet to an elevation of 105.65 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 100 feet to an elevation of 107.10 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 50 feet to an elevation of 108.05 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 25 feet to an elevation of 108.50 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 25 feet to an elevation of 108.80 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 25 feet to an elevation of 109.00 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 25 feet to an elevation of 108.85 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 25 feet to an elevation of 108.55 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 25 feet to an elevation of 108.25 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 75 feet to an elevation of 106.90 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Main street 40 feet to an elevation of 106.90 feet above said datum line, being the center of Main street and at station 41+55 and situated 29 feet north of the south side of Twelfth street. "

Section 3. Said pavement shall be constructed of one of the following types (a) sheet asphalt (b) sheet asphalt (b) asphaltic concrete, or (c) "Warrenite Bitulithic," on a portland cement concrete foundation. Said sheet asphalt (a) shall be made in two layers, consisting of a lower, or binder course, one and one-half inches thick, and an upper, or wearing course of, one and one-half inches thick. Said asphaltic concrete (b), and "Warrenite Bitulithic" (c), shall be made in one layer, two inches thick. The materials, methods and workmanship employed in the construction of all of the above shall conform to the plans and specifications for said work on file with the Commissioner of Public Works, and the City Engineer of the City of Henderson, which are made a part hereof, are hereby approved and adopted. Proposals shall be received on any or all of the aforesaid types of pavement.

Section 4. Catch basins, inlets and necessary drains for draining said Main street shall be constructed on said street, as shown on the said plans for said work, and shall be in the manner and of the materials specified and shown by the aforesaid plans and specifications.

Section 5. All of said North Main Street, between the south property line of Fourth street and a point in Twelfth Street, twenty-nine feet north of the south gutter line, on the south side of said Twelfth street, a width of 60 feet having been heretofore laid off as a public street, and having been open to the unrestricted use of the general public for more than five consecutive years last past, the same is hereby declared to have been dedicated to the City as a public street, and to have been accepted by said City as such, and the City does hereby accept said dedication of said street and said portion thereof, as one of the public streets of the City of Henderson, and hereby declares the improvement of said street as herein provided to be a necessity.

Section 6. That the cost of the improvement of the intersections of said street and portions thereof with other public ways, from property line to property line, shall be assessed against and paid for the city of Henderson.

The delivery of said bonds, either to the purchaser or to the contractor or to other persons entitled thereto, shall be made by the city treasurer at his office in the city of Henderson, and such treasurer shall take receipts for same.

Section 13. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its second and final passage.

An Ordinance ENTITLED, AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF FIRST STREET IN THE CITY OF HENDERSON, KENTUCKY, from the East side of Water Street to the East line of Green Street, in said City, and providing for the Payment of such Improvement., was read; and on motion of Commissioner Hart seconded by Commissioner Johnson, it is ordered, that same be adopted on its second reading.

Aye:-Hall, Hart, Johnson. three ayes.

The Mayor declared the ordinance approved and adopted on its second and final reading, which is as follows;

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF FIRST STREET IN THE CITY OF HENDERSON, KENTUCKY, FROM THE EAST SIDE OF WATER STREET TO THE EAST LINE OF GREEN STREET; IN SAID CITY, AND PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF SUCH IMPROVEMENT.

WHEREAS the Board of Commissioners of the City of Henderson, Kentucky, has heretofore, to-wit, on March 31, 1924, adopted a resolution designating First Street from the east side of Water Street to the East line of Green Street, as a portion of said Street to be improved, which resolution set out in general terms the character and extent of the proposed improvement, and declared such improvement to be unnecessary, and was published in the Henderson Daily Gleaner, a newspaper of general circulation, published in said City on the 21 day of May, 1924; Now therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Henderson, Kentucky:

Section 1. That the following portions of First Street, in the City of Henderson, from the East side of Water Street to the East line of Green Street, and between the curb and gutter lines of said First Street, on the north and south sides thereof, be improved by excavating, grading and draining the same, and by paving the same with either brick, concrete, treated wooden blocks, sheet asphalt, bitulithic asphalt, warrenite asphalt asphaltic concrete, or other bitulithic paving, or bitulithic concrete paving, or other bituminous paving, or other bituminous concrete paving, upon a base of concrete, stone, or other suitable material, as hereinafter provided and by the construction of catch basins, inlets and necessary drains and draining said street, as hereinafter provided.

Section 2. The surface of the paving provided for in Section 1 hereof shall be flush with the gutters, at the gutter lines, on the north and south sides of said street, where such gutters now exist, and shall be flush with the grades for said gutters on the gutter lines, on the north and south sides of said street, where gutters have not been laid, and its center line shall conform to the following grade, to-wit:

"Grade for First Street Between Water and Green Streets.
Beginning at an elevation of 58.60 feet above the city datum line at station 0+00, being the center of First Street 125 feet to an elevation of 60.60 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of First street 315 feet to an elevation of 63.80 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of First street 485 feet to an elevation of 65.75 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of First street 525.00 feet to an elevation of 68.14 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of First street 25 feet to an elevation of 68.45 feet; thence with said center line 25 feet to an elevation of 68.80 feet above said datum line; thence with said center line of First street 25 feet to an elevation of 69.10 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of First street 20 feet to an elevation of 68.84 feet above said datum line, this being the center of First street where it intersects the east gutter line of Green Street?"

Section 3. Said pavement shall be constructed of one of the following types: (a) sheet asphalt (b) asphaltic concrete, or (c) "Warrenite Bitulithic" on a portland cement concrete foundation, or on an asphaltic concrete foundation; said sheet asphalt (a) shall be made in two layers, consisting of a lower or binder course, one and one-half inches thick, and an upper, or wearing course, one and one-half inches thick. Said asphaltic concrete (b), and "Warrenite Bitulithic" (c) shall be made in one layer two inches thick. The materials, methods and workmanship employed in the construction of all of the above shall conform to the plans and specifications for said work, on file with the Commissioner of Public Works of the City of Henderson, a copy of which is also on file with the City Engineer of the City of Henderson, and which are made a part hereof, and are hereby approved and adopted. Proposals shall be received on any or all of the aforesaid types of pavement.

Section 4. Catch basins, inlets and necessary drains for draining said First Street shall be constructed on said street, as shown on the plans for said work, and shall be in the manner and of the materials specified and shown by the aforesaid plans and specifications

Section 5. All of said First Street, between the east line of Water Street, and the East line of Green Street, a width of 60 feet, having been heretofore laid off as a public street, and having been open to the unrestricted use of the general public for more than five consecutive years last past, the same is hereby declared to have been dedicated to the City as a public street and to have been accepted by the City as such; and the

Section 6. That the board of commissioners of said city shall let, by contract, the furnishing of all labor and materials and the construction of the aforesaid improvements, and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of said improvement, upon competitive bidding, to the lowest and best bidder, after the advertisement of the letting of said contract for two consecutive weeks in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city. The mayor is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for proposals for furnishing all labor and materials and the construction of said improvement and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of such work.

The right to reject any and all proposals is hereby reserved to the said board of commissioners.

Proposals shall be received on any or all of the said types of pavement named in Section 5 hereof.

Each bidder shall accompany his proposal by a certified check, payable to the City of Henderson, Ky., for a sum equal to five per cent (5%) of the total amount of his bid, as a guaranty to insure compliance with his bid, and the bid, as a guaranty to insure compliance with his bid, and the same shall be forfeited to the city as liquidated damages in the event the accepted bidder fails to comply with his bid and enter into the contract and bond herein required, within ten (10) days after said contract shall have been awarded to him and he shall have received notice thereof.

When any proposal has been rejected the check deposited therewith shall be returned to the bidder depositing the same.

All proposals shall state prices bid, both in words and figures, and shall be based upon the items and quantities furnished by the city engineer, and must be submitted on blank forms furnished by the city, and must be sealed when submitted.

Proposals will be received and publicly opened by the mayor and commissioners at the time and place designated in the advertisement for proposals, and all proposals received shall be tabulated and compared and laid before the board of commissioners at some regular or special meeting thereof, for the acceptance or rejection of such bids.

Section 7. When any proposal shall have been accepted the bidder making the same shall, not later than ten days after notice from the city so to do, enter into a written contract with the city by which the said bidder shall contract, covenant and agree, among other things, as follows, to-wit:

To furnish all labor and materials, and construct said improvements and guarantee the same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of same;

To finish and complete the said improvements within the time specified in said plans, specifications and proposals;

To execute and deliver to the city a bond in a sum equal to sixty-six and two-thirds per cent. (66-2/3%) of the total amount of such bid, as estimated by the city engineer with some solvent surety or guaranty company authorized to do business in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, as surety thereon, which said bond shall be approved by the board of commissioners of the city, conditioned that the contractor shall promptly begin, faithfully perform and fully complete all of said improvements and pay for all materials mentioned in said proposal and contract, and truly, and in a workmanlike and substantial manner, and in accordance with the terms of said proposal, contract, plans, detailed drawings and specifications provided therefor, complete the said improvements; and faithfully and fully, and in each and every respect comply with the conditions contained in said proposal and contract; and pay all sums of money agreed to be paid for work and labor done in any about the performance of said contract, and save the city of Henderson harmless from all loss and damage on account thereof.

To guarantee the said improvements against defects in workmanship and materials for the full period of five years from the date of acceptance of such work;

To indemnify the city of Henderson against loss or damage on account of any claim or award arising under the Workmen's Compensation Law of the Commonwealth of Kentucky in the execution of such work;

To assume at his own expense the defense of any suit or claim against the city of Henderson growing out of or arising in connection with all or any part of said work, immediately upon receipt of notice from the city of the filing of any suit or claim against it on such account; to bear all the expenses of such defense; and to satisfy any judgment or award that may be obtained thereon against the city.

Section 8. The contract for said improvements shall be ratified by the board of commissioners of this city before the same shall be binding upon the city; and the city shall reserve the right to furnish or require other or additional surety on the bond provided for in the foregoing section at any time, at the cost and expense of the contractor.

The contractor to whom said work shall be awarded shall designate an agent who shall be a resident of the city of Henderson, upon whom process against any such contractor may be served, and upon or to whom any notice herein required may be served or given. The contractor shall state in his said contract the name and address of such agent, and shall at all times during the life of such contract and bond maintain in the city such an agent, and shall give the city written notice of any change in the address of such agent. If such agent be not found in the city at any time any notice which otherwise would be served upon or given to him may be given by registered mail, addressed to the last designated address of such agent, or to the contractor at the address stated in his proposal, and such notice shall constitute a notice to the contractor.

Section 9. That the improvement of said portion of First street shall, except as herein otherwise provided, be made at the exclusive cost of the owners of real estate abutting on such improvements, respectively,

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lots or parcels of real estate for the payment of the costs assessed thereon, which tax shall be due and payable at the office of the treasurer of the city of Henderson upon the completion and acceptance thereof by the board of commissioners, as is provided by law, and no such property shall be exempt from such improvement tax.

That the cost of the improvement of the intersections of said street and portions thereof with other public ways, from property line to property line, shall be assessed against and paid for by the city of Henderson.

That any assessment for any street improvement as provided in this ordinance which exceeds one-half of the value of the lots or parcels of real estate upon which the assessment is made shall, to the extent of such excess, be assessed against and paid by the City of Henderson, but the improvement shall be taken into consideration in fixing the value of such real estate.

Section 10. That the said improvements shall be made on the ten year payment plan, and when same shall have been completed and the cost thereof ascertained and reported to the board of commissioners, and the work shall have been accepted and the engineer's estimate of the cost shall have been confirmed by the board of commissioners, it shall, by ordinance, apportion the cost of said work, less such part as shall be assessed against and paid by the city, equally among the owners of abutting property on both sides of the street improved, according to the number of abutting feet owned by them, respectively; and shall assess and levy a local tax on the several lots or parcels of abutting property at a rate per abutting foot sufficient to produce the part of the cost of the improvement apportioned to such lots or parcels of property, and shall apportion and assess to the city such part of the cost for which it is liable.

The mayor of the city shall cause the said assessment ordinance to be published one time in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city.

Such local taxes shall, at the option of the said property owners, be payable in cash or in ten (10) annual instalments, as provided by law.

The tax bills for such special assessments may, in addition to the other remedies provided by law, be sold and the collection thereof enforced in the manner provided by law for the collection of municipal taxes.

Section 11. That the liens provided by law to secure the payment of the cost of such part of said improvements as the owners of real estate abutting upon such improvements may be respectively bound for as hereinafter provided, shall be enforced as in the manner provided by law for the enforcement of such liens, and in the name of the contractor or other persons entitled thereto; but said city shall in no event be liable for any such costs, nor for the costs of any such improvements except as herein stated, and except to the extent of the funds actually paid to it as herein provided; and a failure to collect any such local assessment or taxes or instalment thereof when due shall create no liability against the city.

Section 12. That in payment for such work the city shall pay to the contractor or other person entitled thereto, within thirty (30) days from the date of publication of the assessing ordinance, such part of said improvements as is herein provided shall be paid by the city; and will, also, at the same time, pay over all assessments which may have been paid in cash.

In order to provide a fund for the immediate payment of such part of the cost of said improvements as shall not be paid in cash, the board of commissioners shall issue and sell improvement bonds in anticipation of the collection of such part of the local taxes assessed and levied therefor as may not be paid within thirty days from the date of the publication of the assessing ordinance, in the manner and form provided by law. Said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of six per centum, payable semi-annually.

The mayor shall advertise for bids for said bonds by notice, published in some newspaper of general circulation, published in said city, one time, at least 10 days before the receipt of bids, and at the time and place designated in said notice the mayor and commissioners shall receive sealed bids for said bonds. Each bidder shall accompany his bid by a certified check, payable to the City of Henderson, or by a bond with good surety, for the sum of One Thousand Dollars, to secure compliance with his bid; and the mayor and commissioners shall publicly open and compare all bids received at some regular or special meeting of the board of commissioners; and the board of commissioners reserves the right to reject any and all bids. Said bonds shall not be sold for less than par and any interest that may have accrued thereon.

Said bonds when executed shall be delivered to the city treasurer for safe keeping, and he shall be responsible therefor.

In case the said bonds be sold, the proceeds thereof shall be placed to the credit of the city, in a separate fund, and the contractor or other person entitled thereto shall be paid for such work out of the said fund. Should the bonds be not sold, the same shall be delivered to the contractor or other person entitled thereto. The delivery of said bonds, either to the purchaser or to the contractor or to other persons entitled thereto, shall be made by the city treasurer at his office in the city of Henderson, and such treasurer shall take receipts for same.

Section 13. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its second and final passage.

RESOLUTION AGREEING TO REFUND BANK TAXES IMPROPERLY PAID DURING THE YEAR 1924.

That whereas the franchises and intangible property of the Ohio Valley Banking & Trust Company, the Henderson National Bank, the Henderson County Savings Bank, and the Farmers Bank & Trust Company, all of Henderson County, Kentucky, have been assessed by the City of Henderson, to be due on August 1, 1924, and----

- WHEREAS the question has arisen as to whether said Banks, or any of them, are liable for said tax upon their said franchise and intangible property for said year, and if liable, for what amount, or at what rate,--

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF HENDERSON, KENTUCKY;

Section 1. That the east and west sides of Adam Street, from the south side of Dixon Street, where it intersects the sidewalk line of said Dixon street to the North side of Cherry Street, where it intersects the line of said Cherry Street, and extending along the property lines between the above named streets out to a point 11-1/2 feet from the property lines on the east and west sides of Adams Street are hereby established as sidewalks, curbs and gutters, and the grades for said sidewalks are hereby fixed and established as follows:

GRADES FOR BOTH EAST AND WEST SIDEWALKS ON ADAMS STREET FROM DIXON STREET TO CHERRY STREET.

Fills. Where present surface of the roadway, etc., is below the grade it shall be filled with selected material from the excavation and place so as to conform to the line, grade and contour of the grade of said street.

The contractor will be paid at so much per cubic yard for excavation and nothing for fills.

Protection of Underground Work and Adjustment of Existing Structures. The contractor shall exercise every precaution to avoid disturbing or injuring sewers, service pipes, catch basins, inlets valves, valve boxes, gas mains, conduits, etc.,

Grading of Approaches to the Improved Streets on the Cross Streets. Whenever a cut or fill is caused by the new grades as established under the new improvement ordinances, where cross streets intersect the improved streets, the contractor will be required to grade the cross streets by filling or cutting same far enough back on the cross streets to make an easy approach to the improved streets on a grade of not more than one foot fall in twenty feet.

The said improvement shall be laid and constructed so as to conform as nearly as practicable to the above grades.

Section IV. Said sidewalks shall be laid and constructed of concrete five (5) feet in width in all respects of the kind quality and dimensions, and of the materials mentioned and described in Section 3, Specifications No. 2, and sub-sections thereunder of an Ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance Providing the Kind and Character of Sidewalks, curbing and Gut-tering to be hereafter used in the City of Henderson, Kentucky and prescribing

Book No. 5, at page 168. There shall be left for a grass plot or grass plots all the space between the property line and outer edge of sidewalks, curb and gutter not occupied by the sidewalk, curb and gutter.

SECTION V. Sections Nos. 1, 7, 8, and 9 of the aforesaid ordinances are also herein referred to and made parts of this ordinance.

SECTION VI. That the entire cost and expense of the aforesaid sidewalk, including the work and the furnishing of the materials as provided for in this ordinance, shall be paid by the owners of the property abutting on the side of the street on which the improvement is made, each corner lot having its sidewalk intersection included in its frontage, and the said costs apportioned among said owners according to the number of abutting feet owned by them respectively. Provided that when the cost of said improvement assessed against any lot or parcel of real estate, or owner thereof, exceeds one-half of the value of such lot or parcel of real estate, such excess shall be paid out of the general fund of the City of Henderson, but the improvement shall be taken into consideration in fixing the value of such real estate.

SECTION VII. That the improvement provided for in this ordinance shall be made on the ten-year plan, and paid for in ten annual installments, as provided for by Section 3458, of the Kentucky Statutes, which is an Act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, entitled;

"AN ACT to amend and re-enact sections three thousand four hundred and forty-nine, three thousand four hundred and fifty, three thousand four hundred and fifty-one, three thousand four hundred and fifty-two, three thousand four hundred and fifty-three, three thousand four hundred and fifty-four, three thousand four hundred and fifty-five, three thousand four hundred and fifty-six, three thousand four hundred and fifty-seven, three thousand four hundred and fifty-eight, three thousand four hundred and fifty-nine of the Kentucky Statutes relating to the control and improvement of public streets, alleys sidewalks, roads, lanes, avenues, highways, and thoroughfares in cities of the third class," Which was approved by the Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky on March 7, 1916, and which is Chapter 10 of the Acts of the General Assembly of Kentucky of 1916.

The work provided for herein shall be done by contract, let by said city upon competitive bidding to the lowest and best bidder, after advertisement for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published in the city of Henderson, Kentucky, the said city reserving the right to reject any and all bids, and each bidder shall be required to accompany his bid with a cash deposit of \$100.00 with the City Clerk of said City or by a certified check for that amount payable to the said City as a guaranty of his good faith to insure compliance with his bid, and which amount shall be forfeited to said City in the event his bid is accepted and he shall fail to comply with his bid and enter into a satisfactory contract and bond for the construction of said work and the furnishing of said material. The bond for said work is hereby fixed at a sum equal to one-half the estimated contract price, and the contract made hereunder shall stipulate a guarantee by the contractor of said work for five years from its acceptance by the Board of Commissioners.

SECTION VIII. All ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION IX. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its second and final passage.

The said improvement shall be laid and constructed so as to conform as nearly as practicable to the above grades.

SECTION V. Said sidewalks shall be laid and constructed of concrete five (5) feet in width in all respects of the kind, quality and dimensions, and of the materials mentioned and described in Section 3, Specifications No. 2, and sub-sections thereunder of an Ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance Providing for the Kind and Character of Sidewalks, Curbing and Guttering to be hereafter used in the City of Henderson, Kentucky, and prescribing specifications for same", passed on its second reading by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Henderson, Ky., on 30th day of September, 1922, and recorded in the office of City Clerk of said City, in Ordinance Book No. 5, at page 168. There shall be left for a grass plot or grass plots, all the space between ~~between~~ the property line and outer edge of sidewalks, curb and gutter not occupied by the sidewalk, curb and gutter.

SECTION VI. Sections Nos. 1, 7, 8 and 9 of the aforesaid ordinance are also herein referred to and made parts of this ordinance.

SECTIONS VII. That the entire cost and expense of the aforesaid sidewalk, including the work and the furnishing of the materials as provided for in this ordinance, shall be paid by the owners of the property abutting on the side of the street on which the improvement is made, each corner lot having its sidewalk intersection included in its frontage, and the said costs apportioned among said owners according to the number of abutting feet owned by them respectively. Provided that when the cost of said improvement assessed against any lot or parcel of real estate, or owner thereof, exceeds one-half of the value of such lot or parcel of real estate, such excess shall be paid out of the general fund of the City of Henderson, but the improvement shall be taken into consideration in fixing the value of such real estate.

SECTION VIII. That the improvement provided for in this ordinance shall be made on the ten-year plan, and paid for in ten annual installments, as provided for by Section 3458, of the Kentucky Statutes, which is an Act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, entitled;

"AN ACT to amend and re-enact sections three thousand four hundred and forty-nine, three thousand four hundred and fifty, three thousand four hundred and fifty-one, three thousand four hundred and fifty-two, three thousand four hundred and fifty-three, three thousand four hundred and fifty-four, three thousand four hundred and fifty-five, three thousand four hundred and fifty-six, three thousand four hundred and fifty-seven, three thousand four hundred and fifty-eight, three thousand four hundred and fifty-nine of the Kentucky statutes relating to the control and improvement of public street, alleys, sidewalks, roads, lanes, avenues, highways, and thoroughfares in cities of the third class," which was approved by the Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky on March 7, 1916, and which is Chapter 10 of the Acts of the General Assembly of Kentucky of 1916.

The work provided for herein shall be done by contract, let by said City upon competitive bidding to the lowest and best bidder, after advertisement for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published in the city of Henderson, Kentucky, the said city reserving the right to reject any and all bids, and each bidder shall be required to accompany his bid with a cash deposit of \$100.00 with the City Clerk of said City or by a certified check for that amount payable to the said city as guaranty of his good faith to insure compliance with his bid, and which amount shall be forfeited to said City in the event his bid is accepted and he shall fail to comply with his bid and enter into a satisfactory contract and bond for the construction of said work and the furnishing of said material. The bond for said work is hereby fixed at a sum equal to one-half the estimated contract price, and the contract made hereunder shall stipulate a guarantee by the contractor of said work for five years from the acceptance by the Board of Commissioners.

SECTION IX. All ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION X. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its second and final passage.

An Ordinance ENTITLED, AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF SECOND STREET, BETWEEN THE IMPROVED PORTIONS OF SAME, FROM WATER STREET TO INGRAM STREET, IN THE CITY OF HENDERSON, KENTUCKY, AND PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT FOR SUCH IMPROVEMENT.

WHEREAS the Board of Commissioners of the City of Henderson, Ken-

portion of said street to be improved, which resolution set out in general terms the character and extent of the proposed improvement, and declared such improvement to be a necessity, and was published in the Henderson Daily Gleaner, a newspaper of general circulation published in said City, on the 18th day of June, 1924; Now therefore--

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF HENDERSON, KENTUCKY;

Section I. That the following portions of Second Street, in the City of Henderson, Kentucky, from the east side of Water Street to the east side of Ingram Street, lying between the improved eighteen-foot driveways on either side thereof, be improved by excavating, grading and draining the same, and by paving the same with either brick, concrete, treated wooden blocks, sheet asphalt, bitulithic asphalt, "Warrenite" asphalt, asphaltic concrete, or other bitulithic paving, or bitulithic concrete paving, or other bituminous paving, or other bituminous concrete paving, upon a base of concrete, stone or other suitable material, as hereinafter provided, and by the construction of catch basins, inlets and necessary drains, and draining said street as hereinafter provided.

Section II. The surface of the paving provided for in Section I hereof shall be flush with the inner line of the improved eighteen-foot driveways on either side thereof, and its center line shall conform to the following grade, to-wit:

"Beginning at an elevation of 62.19 feet above the City datum line at station 0. 0; being the center of Second Street in the east line of Water street; thence with the center line of Second street 50 feet to an elevation of 63.08 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 25 feet to an elevation of 63.50 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 50 feet to an elevation of 64.36 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 25 feet to an elevation of 64.78 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 25 feet to an elevation of 65.27 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 50 feet to an elevation of 66.12 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 50 feet to an elevation of 67.20 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 75 feet to an elevation of 68.93 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 75 feet to an elevation of 70.84 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 25 feet to an elevation of 71.54 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 25 feet to an elevation of 72.28 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 25 feet to an elevation of 72.71 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 25 feet to an elevation of 72.84 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 25 feet to an elevation of 73.20 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 25 feet to an elevation of 73.11 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 25 feet to an elevation of 73.38 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 25 feet to an elevation of 73.85 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 125 feet to an elevation of 75.32 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 50 feet to an elevation of 76.61 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 50 feet to an elevation of 75.64 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 100 feet to an elevation of 74.41 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 25 feet to an elevation of 74.14 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 50 feet to an elevation of 73.78 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 100 feet to an elevation of 73.22 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 75 feet to an elevation of 73.0 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 125 feet to an elevation of 72.41 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 50 feet to an elevation of 72.17 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 25 feet to an elevation of 71.84 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 125 feet to an elevation of 71.21 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 25 feet to an elevation of 71.28 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 25 feet to an elevation of 71.03 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 75 feet to an elevation of 70.78 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 50 feet to an elevation of 70.40 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 50 feet to an elevation of 70.12 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 50 feet to an elevation of 69.78 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 150 feet to an elevation of 69.05 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 50 feet to an elevation of 68.83 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Second street 14.5 feet to an elevation of 68.74 feet above said datum line, being the center line of Second street where it intersects the east property line of Ingram street."

SECTION III. Said pavement shall be constructed of one of the following types; (a) sheet asphalt (b) asphaltic concrete, or (c) "Warrenite Bitulithic" on a portland cement concrete foundation, or on an asphaltic concrete foundation, said sheet asphalt (a) shall be made in two layers, consisting of a lower, or binder course, one and one-half inches thick, and an upper, or wearing course, one and one-half inches thick. Said asphaltic concrete (b), and "Warrenite Bitulithic" (c) shall be made in one layer two inches thick. The materials, methods and workmanship employed in the construction of all of the above shall conform to the plans and specification

types of pavement.

Section IV. Catch basins, inlets and necessary drains for draining said Second street shall be constructed on said street as shown on the plans for said work, and shall be in the manner and of the materials specified and shown by the aforesaid plans and specifications.

Section V. All of said portion of said Second Street, between the improved eighteen-foot driveways on either side thereof, from the east line of Water street, to the east line of Ingram street, a width of 100 feet, having been heretofore laid off as a public street, and having been opened to the unrestricted use of the general public for more than five consecutive years last past, the same has been and is hereby declared to have been dedicated to the City as a public street, and to have been accepted by the City as such, and the City does hereby accept such dedication of said street, and said portion thereof, as one of the public streets of the City of Henderson, and hereby declares the improvement of said street as herein provided to be a necessity.

Section 6. That the board of commissioners of said City shall let, by contract, the furnishing of all labor and materials and the construction of the aforesaid improvement, and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of said improvement, upon competitive bidding, to the lowest and best bidder, after the advertisement of the letting of said contract for two consecutive weeks in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city. The Mayor is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for proposals for furnishing all labor and materials and the construction of said improvement and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of such work.

The right to reject any and all proposals is hereby reserved to the said board of commissioners.

Proposals shall be received on any or all of the said types of pavement named in sections 1 and 3 hereof.

Cash bidder shall accompany his proposal by a certified check, payable to the City of Henderson, Ky., for a sum equal to five per cent (5%) of the total amount of his bid, as a guaranty to insure compliance with his bid, and the same shall be forfeited to the city in the event the accepted bidder fails to comply with his bid and enter into the contract and bond herein required, within ten (10) days after said contract shall have been awarded to him and he shall have received notice hereof.

When any proposal has been rejected the check deposited therewith shall be returned to the bidder depositing the same.

All proposals shall state prices bid, both in words and figures, and shall be based upon the items and quantities furnished by the city engineer, and must be submitted on blank forms furnished by the city, and must be sealed when submitted.

Proposals will be received and publicly opened by the mayor and commissioners at the time and place designated in the advertisement for proposals; and all proposals received shall be tabulated and compared and laid before the board of commissioners at some regular of special meeting thereof, for the acceptance or rejection of such bids.

Section 7. When any proposal shall have been accepted the bidder making the same shall, not later than ten days after notice from the city so to do, enter into a written contract with the city by which the said bidder shall contract, covenant and agree, among other things, as follows, to-wit:

To furnish all labor and materials, and construct said improvements and guarantee the same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of same;

To finish and complete the said improvements within the time specified in said plans, specification and proposals;

To execute and deliver to the city a bond in a sum equal to sixty-six and two-thirds per cent. (66-2/3%) of the total amount of such bid, as estimated by the city engineer with some solvent surety or guaranty company authorized to do business in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, as surety thereon, which said bond shall be approved by the board of commissioners of the city, conditioned that the contractor shall promptly begin, faithfully perform and fully complete all of said improvements and pay for all materials mentioned in said proposals and contract, and well and truly, and in a workmanlike and substantial manner, and in accordance with the terms of said proposal, contract, plans, detailed drawings, and specifications provided therefor, complete the said improvements; and faithfully and fully, and in each and every respect comply with the conditions contained in said proposal and contract; and pay all sums of money agreed to be paid for work and labor done in and about the performance of said contract, and save the city of Henderson harmless from all loss and damage on account thereof.

To guarantee the said improvements against defects in workmanship and materials for the full period of five years from the date of acceptance of such work;

To indemnify the city of Henderson against loss or damage on account of any claim or award arising under the Workmen's Compensation Law of the Commonwealth of Kentucky in the execution of such work;

To assume at his own expense the defense of any suit or claim against the city of Henderson growing out of or arising in connection with all or any part of said work, immediately upon receipt of notice from the city of the filing of any suit or claim against it on such account; to bear all the expenses of such defense; and to satisfy and judgement or award that may be obtained thereon against the city.

Section 8. The contract for said improvements shall be ratified by the board of commissioners of this city before the same shall be binding upon the city; and the city shall reserve the right to furnish other or additional surety on the bond provided for in the foregoing section at any

notice herein required may be served, and upon or to whom given, The contractor shall state in his said contract the name and address of such agent, and shall at all times during the life of such contract and bond maintain in the city such an agent, and shall give the city written notice of any change in the address of such agent. If such agent be not found in the city at any time any notice which otherwise would be served upon or given to him may be given by registered mail, addressed to the last designated address of such agent, or to the contractor at the address stated in his proposal, and such notice shall constitute a notice to the contractor.

Section 9. That the improvement of said portion of Second street shall, except as herein otherwise provided, be made at the exclusive cost of the owners of real estate abutting on such improvements, respectively, and shall be apportioned among and assessed upon the lots or parcels of real estate abutting on such improvement, according to the number of front or abutting feet of each property owner; and tax shall be levied upon such lots or parcels of real estate for the payment of the costs assessed thereon, which tax shall be due and payable at the office of the treasurer of the city of Henderson upon the completion and acceptance thereof by the board of commissioners, and as provided by law, and no such property shall be exempt from such improvement tax.

That the cost of the improvement of the intersections of said street and portions thereof with other public ways, from property line to property line, shall be assessed against and paid for by the city of Henderson.

That any assessment for any street improvement as provided in this ordinance which exceeds one-half of the value of the lots or parcels of real estate upon which the assessment is made shall, to the extent of such excess, be assessed against and paid by the City of Henderson, but the improvement shall be taken into consideration in fixing the value of such real estate.

Section 10. That the said improvements shall be made on the ten year payment plan, and when same shall have been completed and the cost thereof ascertained and reported to the board of commissioners, and the work shall have been accepted and the engineer's estimate of the cost shall have been confirmed by the board of commissioners, it shall, by ordinance, apportion the cost of said work, less such part as shall be assessed against and paid by the city, equally among the owners of abutting property on both sides of the street improved, according to the number of abutting feet owned by them respectively; and shall assess and levy a local tax on the several lots or parcels of abutting property at a rate per abutting foot sufficient to produce the part of the cost of the improvement apportioned to such lots or parcels of property, and shall apportion and assess to the city such part of the cost for which it is liable.

The Mayor of the city shall cause the said assessment ordinance to be published one time in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city.

Such local taxes shall, at the option of the said property owners, be payable in cash or in ten (10) annual instalments, as provided by law.

The tax bills for such special assessments may, in addition to the other remedies provided by law, be sold and the collection thereof enforced in the manner provided by law for the collection of municipal taxes.

Section 11. That the liens provided by law to secure the payment of the cost of such part of said improvements as the owners of real estate abutting upon such improvements may be respectively bound for as hereinafter provided, shall be enforced as in the manner provided by law for the enforcement of such liens, and in the name of the contractor or other persons entitled thereto; but said city shall in no event be liable for any such cost, nor for the costs of any such improvements except as herein stated, and except to the extent of the funds actually paid to it as herein provided; and a failure to collect any such local assessment or taxes or instalment thereof when due shall create no liability against the city.

Section 12. That in payment for such work the city shall pay to the contractor or other person entitled thereto, within thirty (30) days from the date of the publication of the assessing ordinance, such part of said improvements as is herein provided shall be paid by the city; and will, also at the same time, pay over all assessments which may have been paid in cash.

In order to provide a fund for the immediate payment of such part of the cost of said improvements as shall not be paid in cash, the board of commissioners shall issue and sell improvement bonds in anticipation of the collection of such part of the local taxes assessed and levied therefor as may not be paid within thirty days from the date of the publication of the assessing ordinance, in the manner and form provided by law. Said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of six per centum, payable semi-annually.

The Mayor shall advertise for bids for said bonds by notice, published in some newspaper of general circulation, published inside city, one time, at least 10 days before the receipt of bids, and at the time and place designated in said notice the mayor and commissioners shall receive sealed bids for said bonds. Each bidder shall accompany his bid by a certified check, payable to the city of Henderson, or by a bond with good surety, for the sum of One Thousand Dollars, to secure compliance with his bid; and the mayor and commissioners shall publicly open and compare all bids received at some regular or special meeting of the board of commissioners; and the board of commissioners reserves the right to reject any and all bids. Said bonds shall not be sold for less than par and any interest that may have accrued thereon.

Said bonds when executed shall be delivered to the city Treasurer for safe keeping, and he shall be responsible therefor.

That the improvement of said portion of Third street shall, except as herein otherwise provided, be made at the exclusive cost of the owners of real estate abutting on such improvements, respectively, and shall be apportioned among and assessed upon the lots or parcels of real estate abutting on such improvement, according to the number of front or abutting feet of each property owner; and tax shall be levied upon such lots or parcels of real estate for the payment of the cost assessed thereon, which tax shall be due and payable at the office of the treasurer of the City of Henderson upon the completion and acceptance thereof by the board of commissioners as is provided by law, and no such property shall be exempt from such improvement tax.

That the cost of the improvement of the intersections of said street and portions thereof with other public ways, from property line, shall be assessed against and paid for by the City of Henderson.

That any assessment for any street improvement as provided in this ordinance which exceeds one-half of the value of the lots or parcels of real estate upon which the assessment is made shall, to the extent of such excess, be assessed against and paid by the City of Henderson, but the improvement shall be taken into consideration in fixing the value of such real estate.

Section 10. That the said improvements shall be made on the ten year payment plan, and when same shall have been completed and the cost thereof ascertained and reported to the board of commissioners, and the work shall have been accepted and the engineer's estimate of the cost shall have been confirmed by the board of commissioners, it shall, by ordinance, apportion the cost of said work, less such part as shall be assessed against and paid by the city, equally among the owners of abutting property on both sides of the street improved, according to the number of abutting feet owned by them respectively; and shall assess and levy a local tax on the several lots or parcels of abutting property at a rate per abutting foot sufficient to produce the part of the cost of the improvement apportioned to such lots or parcels of property, and shall apportion and assess to the city such part of the cost for which it is liable.

The Mayor of the city shall cause the said assessment ordinance to be published one time in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city.

Such local taxes shall, at the option of the said property owners, be payable in cash or in ten (10) annual installments, as provided by law.

The tax bills for such special assessments may, in addition to the other remedies provided by law, be sold and the collection thereof enforced in the manner provided by law for the collection of municipal taxes.

Section 11. That the liens provided by law to secure the payment of the cost of such part of said improvements as the owners of real estate abutting upon such improvements may be respectively bound for as hereinafter provided, shall be enforced as in the manner provided by law for the enforcement of such liens, and in the name of the contractor or other persons entitled thereto; but said city shall in no event be liable for any such costs, nor for the costs of any such improvements except as herein stated, and except to the extent of the funds actually paid to it as herein provided; and a failure to collect any such local assessment or taxes or instalment thereof when due shall create no liability against the city.

Section 12. That in payment for such work the city shall pay to the contractor or other person entitled thereto, within thirty (30) days from the date of the publication of the assessing ordinance, such part of said improvements as is herein provided shall be paid by the city; and will, also, at the same time, pay over all assessments which may have been paid in cash.

In order to provide a fund for the immediate payment of such part of the cost of said improvements as shall not be paid in cash, the board of commissioners shall issue and sell improvement bonds in anticipation of the collection of such part of the local taxes assessed and levied therefor as may not be paid within thirty days from the date of the publication of the assessing ordinance, in the manner and form provided by law. Said bonds shall bear interest at the rate six per centum, payable semi-annually.

The Mayor shall advertise for bids for said bonds by notice, published in some newspaper of general circulation, published in said city, one time, at least 10 days before the receipt of bids, and at the time and place designated in said notice the mayor and commissioners shall receive sealed bids for said bonds. Each bidder shall accompany his bid by a certified check, payable to the City of Henderson, or by a bond with good surety, for the sum of One Thousand Dollars, to secure compliance with his bid; and the mayor and commissioners shall publicly open and compare all bids received at some regular or special meeting of the board of commissioners; and the board of commissioners reserves the right to reject any and all bids. Said bonds shall not be sold for less than par and any interest that may

placed to the credit of the city, in a separate fund, and the contractor or other person entitled thereto shall be paid for such work out of the said fund. Should the bonds be not sold, the same shall be delivered to the contractor or other person entitled thereto. The delivery of said bonds, either to the purchaser or to the contractor or to other persons entitled thereto, shall be made by the city treasurer at his office in the city of Henderson, and such treasurer shall take receipts for same.

Section 13. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its second and final passage.

An Ordinance ENTITLED, AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF LETCHER STREET, IN THE CITY OF HENDERSON, KENTUCKY, FROM THE SOUTH SIDE OF WASHINGTON STREET TO THE NORTH LINE OF BAILEY STREET, IN SAID CITY, AND PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF SUCH IMPROVEMENT.

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the City of Henderson, Kentucky, has heretofore, to-wit: on the 7th., day of April, 1924, adopted a resolution designating Letcher Street from the south side of Washington Street to the north side of Bailey Street, as a portion of said Letcher Street to be improved, which resolution set out in general terms the character and extent of the proposed improvement, and declared such improvement to be a necessity, and was published in the Henderson Daily Gleaner, a newspaper of general circulation published in said City on the 10 day of June, 1924; Now therefore-----

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Henderson, Kentucky:

Section 1. That the following portion of Letcher Street, in the City of Henderson, Kentucky, from the south side of Washington Street to the north line of Bailey street and between the curb and gutter lines of said Letcher Street on the East and West sides thereof, be improved by excavating, grading and draining the same and by paving the same with either brick, concrete, treated wooden blocks, sheet asphalt, bitulithic asphalt, "warrenite" asphalt, asphaltic concrete, or other bitulithic paving, or bitulithic concrete paving, or other bituminous paving, or other bituminous concrete paving, upon a base of concrete, stone, or other suitable material, as hereinafter provided, and by the construction of catch basins, in-lets and necessary drains, and draining said street as hereinafter provided.

Section 2. The surface of the paving provided for in Section 1 hereof shall be flush with the gutters at the gutter lines on the East and West sides of said street where such gutters now exist, and shall be flush with the grades for said gutters on the gutter lines, on the east and west sides of said street where gutters have not been laid, and its center line shall conform to the following grade, to-wit:

Beginning at an elevation of 70.10 feet above the City datum line at station 0+0, being the center line of Letcher Street where it intersects the south gutter line of Washington street and runs with the center line of Letcher street 100 feet to an elevation of 70.50 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 50 feet to an elevation of 70.75 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 50 feet to an elevation of 71.13 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 50 feet to an elevation of 71.32 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 100 feet to an elevation of 72.60 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 75 feet to an elevation of 73.42 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 50 feet to an elevation of 74.32 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 125 feet to an elevation of 78.60 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 150 feet to an elevation of 83.75 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 150 feet to an elevation of 87.65 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 25 feet to an elevation of 87.90 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 25 feet to an elevation of 87.70 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 25 feet to an elevation of 87.10 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 75 feet to an elevation of 84.65 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 25 feet to an elevation of 84.35 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 50 feet to an elevation of 83.95 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 125 feet to an elevation of 84.62 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 50 feet to an elevation of 85.15 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 150 feet to an elevation of 88.25 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 100 feet to an elevation of 90.25 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 25 feet to an elevation of 90.60 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 25 feet to an elevation of 90.70 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 25 feet to an elevation of 90.60 feet above said datum line; thence with the center line of Letcher Street 25 feet to

Section 3. Said pavement shall be constructed of one of the following types: (a) sheet asphalt (b) asphaltic concrete, or (c) "Warrenite Bitulithic" on a portland cement concrete foundation, or on an asphaltic concrete foundation, said sheet asphalt (a) shall be made in two layers, consisting of a lower, or binder course, one and one-half inches thick, and an upper, or wearing course, one and one-half inches thick. Said asphaltic concrete (b), and "Warrenite Bitulithic" (c) shall be made in one layer two inches thick. The materials, methods and workmanship employed in the construction of all of the above shall conform to the plans and specifications for said work on file with the Commissioner of Public Works of the City of Henderson, a copy of which is also on file with the City Engineer of the City of Henderson, and which are made a part hereof, and are hereby approved and adopted. Proposals shall be received on any or all of the aforesaid types of pavement.

Section 4. Catch basins, in-lets and necessary drains for draining said Letcher Street shall be constructed on said street as shown on the plans for said work and shall be in the manner and of the materials specified and shown by the aforesaid specifications.

Section 5. All of said Letcher Street between the South line of Washington Street and the north line of Bailey Street, a width of 28 feet having been heretofore laid off as a public street and having been open to the unrestricted use of the general public for more than five consecutive years last past, the same is hereby declared to have been dedicated to the City as public street, and to have been accepted by the City as such; and the City does hereby accept said dedication of said street, and the said portion thereof, as one of the public streets of the City of Henderson, and hereby declares the improvement of said street, as herein provided, to be a necessity.

Section 6. That the board of commissioners of said city shall let, by contract, the furnishing of all labor and materials and the construction of the aforesaid improvements, and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of said improvement, upon competitive bidding, to the lowest and best bidder, after the advertisement of the letting of said contract for two consecutive weeks in some newspaper of general circulation published in said City. The mayor is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for proposals for furnishing all labor and materials and the construction of said improvements and the guaranty of same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of such work.

The right to reject any and all proposals is hereby reserved to the said board of commissioners.

Proposals shall be received on any or all of the said types of pavement named in Section 3 hereof.

Each bidder shall accompany his proposal by a certified check, payable to the City of Henderson, Ky., for a sum equal to five per cent (5%) of the total amount of his bid, as a guaranty to insure compliance with his bid, and the same shall be forfeited to the city as liquidated damages, in the event the accepted bidder fails to comply with his bid and enter into the contract and bond herein required, within ten (10) days after said contract shall have been awarded to him and he shall have received notice thereof.

When any proposal has been rejected the check deposited therewith shall be returned to the bidder depositing the same.

All proposals shall state prices bid, both in words and figures, and shall be based upon the items and quantities furnished by the city engineer, and must be submitted on blank forms furnished by the city, and must be sealed when submitted.

Proposals will be received and publicly opened by the Mayor and commissioners at the time and place designated in the advertisement for proposals, and all proposals received shall be tabulated and compared and laid before the board of commissioners at some regular or special meeting for their acceptance or rejection of such bids.

city so to do, enter into a written contract with the city by which the said bidder shall contract, covenant and agree, among other things, as follows, to-wit:

To furnish all labor and materials, and construct said improvements and guarantee the same for a period of five years from the date of acceptance of same;

To finish and complete the said improvements within the time specified in said plans, specifications and proposals;

To execute and deliver to the city a bond in a sum equal to sixty-six and two-thirds percent (66-2/3%) of the total amount of such bid, as estimated by the city engineer with some solvent surety or guaranty company authorized to do business in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, as surety thereon, which said bond shall be approved by the board of commissioners of the city, conditioned that the contractor shall promptly begin, faithfully perform and fully complete all of said improvements and pay for all materials mentioned in said proposal and contract, and well and truly, and in a workmanlike and substantial manner, and in accordance with the terms of said proposal, contract, plans, detailed drawings and specifications provided therefor, complete the said improvements; and faithfully and fully, and in each and every respect comply with the conditions contained in said proposal and contract; and pay all sums of money agreed to be paid for work and labor done in and about the performance of said contract, and save the city of Henderson harmless from all loss and damage on account thereof.

To guarantee the said improvements against defects in workmanship and materials for the full period of five years from the date of acceptance of such work:

To indemnify the city of Henderson against loss damage on account of any claim or ward arising under the Workmen's Compensation Law of the Commonwealth of Kentucky in the execution of such work;

To assume at his own expense the defense of any suit or claim against the city of Henderson growing out of or arising in connection with all or any part of said work, immediately upon receipt of notice from the city of the filing of any suit or claim against it on such account; to bear all the expenses of such defense; and to satisfy any judgment or award that may be obtained thereon against the city.

Section 8. The contract for said improvements shall be ratified by the board of commissioners of this city before the same shall be binding upon the city; and the city shall reserve the right to furnish other or additional surety on the bond provided for in the foregoing section at any time, at the cost and expense of the contractor.

The contractor to whom said work shall be awarded shall designate an agent who shall be a resident of the city of Henderson upon whom process against any such contractor may be served, and upon or to whom any notice herein required may be served or given. The contractor shall state in his said contract the name and address of such agent, and shall at all times during the life of such contract and bond maintain in the city such an agent, and shall give the city written notice of any change in the address of such agent. If such agent be not found in the city at any time any notice which otherwise would be served upon or given to him may be given by registered mail, addressed to the last designated address of such agent, or to the contractor at the address stated in his proposal, and such notice shall constitute a notice to the contractor.

Section 9. That the improvement of said portion of Letcher Street shall, except as herein otherwise provided, be made at the exclusive cost of the owners of real estate abutting on such improvements, respectively, and shall be apportioned among and assessed upon the lots or parcels of real estate abutting on such improvement, according to the number of front or abutting feet of each property owner; and tax shall be levied upon such lots or parcels of real estate for the payment of the costs assessed thereon, which tax shall be due and payable at the office of the treasurer of the city of Henderson upon the completion and acceptance thereof by the board of commissioners as is provided by law, and no such property shall be exempt from such improvement tax.

Section 3. When any warrant has been properly prepared, drawn, signed by the Auditor and countersigned by the Clerk, as directed in the next preceding Section hereof, same shall be paid by the Treasurer of the City of Henderson.

Section 4. This ordinance shall be of full force and effect from and after its passage on its second or final reading, and all ordinances, or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

There are two courses open to the City Commissioners in the payment of this sum of money; One is to repudiate it as a debt which exceeds the constitutional limit of indebtedness that could be contracted last year, and the other is, as said in the case of McCrocklin vs. Nelson County, to treat this as an indebtedness which the City in good faith contracted for, but provided no means for the payment thereof, and consequently a debt to be carried from year to year until the city has sufficient amount of funds to pay. I most heartily recommend the latter plan.- Commissioner Hart, seconded by Commissioner Johnson, moved that the report be received and filed, and that the City Attorney, be directed and authorized to prepare new resolutions for the preparation of the improvement bonds on streets abutting school property, excluding said school assessments from the bonds.

Beginning at the manhole at the intersection of Elm and Third streets, and extending East on Third Street along a line 35 feet North of the South property line to a manhole at the intersection of Green and Third Streets. Said distance being about 520 feet.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners that said sewer be built and laid in the ground at the grade and according to the specifications now on file in the office of the City Engineer for the City of Henderson, Kentucky.

WITNESSETH: That for and in consideration of the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000.00) per annum, to be paid by the City of Henderson to the said Moseley Hospital in monthly installments of Four Hundred and Sixteen Dollars and Sixty-Six and two-thirds cents (\$416.66-2/3) each, the said Moseley Hospital hereby agrees to receive at its private hospital at the northeast corner of Washington and Adams streets, in the City of Henderson, Kentucky, such pauper patients as the City of Henderson may from time to time send to said hospital for hospital care and to furnish the room, board, lodging, and all necessary care, including nursing and surgical dressings for said pauper patients.

It is further agreed that the Moseley Hospital is to furnish one of its staff of surgeons, namely, either Dr.J.C.Moseley or Dr.M.Y.Marshall, to do any and all surgery that said pauper patients may be in need of, when requested by the City of Henderson through its City Physician, and to do so without cost to the City of Henderson for said surgical attention.

It is further stipulated and agreed and made a part hereof that the City of Henderson is to send no patients to said hospital with any infectious or contagious disease that might endanger the health or lives of other patients, nor shall said Moseley Hospital be required to receive any such patients.

It is further stipulated and agreed that no patient may be sent to the Moseley Hospital without an order signed by the Mayor of the City, or the Commissioner of Public Health, provided, however, that in case of emergency, pauper patients may be received upon the written order of the Chief of Police or any policeman or any commissioner.

It is expressly stipulated and agreed between the parties hereto that the said City of Henderson, by giving thirty days written notice of its intention so to do, shall have the option of renewing this contract at the time of its expiration for a period of two years longer, upon the same terms and conditions as stipulated herein.

This contract shall take effect and be in force ten days after the passage of a resolution by the City of Henderson on its second or final reading, and shall continue in force for a period of two years from date thereof.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF witness the hands of the parties in duplicate. The said City signing by its Mayor, attested by the City Clerk of said City, and under the seal of said City, and the Moseley Hospital by the signature of its president, and attested by the signature of its secretary.
